Next Monday Will See Committees in Field for Financial Help

COUNTY TO RAISE \$32,000

Slogan is "Give a Day's Pay"—
Campaign to the 18th November

Next Monday the United War Work campaign will start in Washington County. J. H. Garrett is the Chairman for the county; Sam Weil is the Publicity Director, and W. V. Bergen is the treasurer. The purpose of the big drive is to get funds for the Y. M. C. A., the Knights of Columbus, the Jewish Welfare Board, War Camp Community Service, American Library Ass'n, and the Salvation Army.

The quota for the county is fixed at \$32,325, and an active campaign will be made to get the county over the top by the 18th of the month. When the committees call on you see that you do your bit. The fund should easily be raised in less than the time allotted.

The organizations engaged in war work in the camps and on the lines are independent of the government, but they are doing a wonderful work through private subscriptions. They are all recognized by the government as being indispensable, and their labors are to be applauded.

Give cheerfully—and remember the slogan—"Give a Day's Pay." The war may soon be over, and if it is, then we will need all that is given in the process of demobilization and for the peace army that must remain there for some time; the war may continue, and if it shall, then again the agencies will need all they can get. Sunday Measure did not Appeal to Voters of Hillsboro

GOES OVER TWO TO ONE

Registering No. 372; Registering Yes, 144; Cast, 516

City election for Hillsboro was carried on conjointly by the county election board at the City Hall, Tuesday. The big battle of the ballots was over the Measure: "Shall the City Council Pass an Ordinance Closing Moving Picture Shows on Sunday."

The votes in the affirmative were 144, and the votes against the proposed ordinance were 372. This made a total of 516 votes.

And so it comes to pass that "Tatty Arbuckle" and Charlie Chaplin can visit Hillsboro on Sundays for the time being.

There was considerable public discussion over the fight, and the poor showing for the measure was a matter of much surprise.

There was no opposition on the ticket elected to officer the city for the coming term. The vote stood:

I hardly think that the people need to be urged to attend this celebration at 4 o'clock, and that the business houses of the city co-operate by closing their stores for an hour or so during the exercises.

EDWARD M. GRIEBELER

Edwin M. Griebeler, for years a wagon maker at Gaston, died on Nov. 1, 1918, being aged over 76 years. He was born in New York City, March 23, 1842, and moved with his parents, as a child, to Northern Wisconsin, near Lake Superior, where he lived until manhood. He then moved to Clinton, Wis., where on Feb. 26, 1874, he was married to Ann M. Butler. Later they moved to Minnabai, Iowa, where they resided until 1883, when they came to Oregon, settling at Gaston, where he resided for 34 years.

His wife passed away nearly five years ago. He leaves the following children: Mrs. Florence A. Everest, wife of Fred A. Everest, county recorder-elect, Hillsboro; Mrs. Sophronia Child, Boring, Ore.; Mrs. Maude Storey, Gas-Ore; Mrs. Maude Storey and Orton Griebeler, of Gaston. He left 17 grandchildren. Deceased was a member of the Evangelical Church since 1898. Services were held at the Donelson Undertaking Parlor Sunday, Rev. J. T. Anderson officiating. Interment was at Gaston.

PHILIP VAN MELTEBEKE

Philip Van Meltebeke, aged 20 years, enlisted as a volunteer, and stationed at Fort McArthur, died November 4, 1918, of influenza. His mother is Phairida Van Meltebeke, of near Laurel. The young soldier was ill but a few days. He was very anxious to serve his country and went before the war board early in the summer and asked to be sent to one of the cantonments. The remains are to be sent to Laurel for interment, under the direction of Undertaker Limber.

MRS. BLAIR LOSES SON

Mrs. Ruth A. Blair, well known in this city, where she resided for a number of years, has received word that her son, Robert I. Blair, was killed on the American front, October 5. He belonged to the 27th Engineers, and enlisted from Spokane. His brother, H. T. Blair, is a linotype operator on the Oregonian, and formerly worked for the Argus. Robert Blair was born at Canton, Ill., and was about 33 years of age. His mother lives with her son, H. T., near Ryan Place, on the Oregon Electric.

BAN ON FLU LIFTED

The ban on the Flu is to be lifted this week. This means that the churches will hold services Sunday, and school will open Monday.

COL. J. A. SHANNON

Col. Jas. A. Shannon, a nephew of Mrs. R. Crandall, of this city, was wounded in action at the capture of Chateaufort, Oct. 8, on the American front, and died shortly afterward. He was a graduate of West Point, and one of the able young officers of the Army. He commanded the famous Apache Scouts in Pershing's expedition, and his death was dramatic. Col. Shannon had joined the division only five days before he was wounded, leaving the General H. Q. office to take part in the action. After an earnest request to get into action, he was given command of a regiment about to advance. He walked six miles in the darkness to get to his command and led them in person at dawn. After reaching the center of town, he was struck by a shell, receiving a nasty neck wound. It was noon before the ambulance could reach the village where he lay wounded, and when he was told there was no chance for his life he asked to see a minister. His vertebrae was cut, although he retained consciousness. He asked the priest to read a chapter from the bible, and said, "That's the Great Stuff, isn't it?" The Col. had the habit of reading a chapter from the bible every night before retiring, whether on the field, in camp, or at his club in Washington, D. C. He died a few hours after reaching the mobile hospital, and was buried the next day. Col. Shannon was a son of Mrs. Crandall's brother, C. E. Shannon, of Muskogee, Oklahoma. He leaves a widow, who is daughter of Brig-Gen. Elid Hoyle, of Ft. Hamilton, N. Y.

J. M. Weisenback, of North Plains, dairying on the old Darcy place, was over to the city Tuesday. He is milking 22 cows these days, and it is some work.
