Delegates appointed to attend the meeting in Portland to devise ways and means for the reconstruction coming to Oregon as the boys come home from the army and navy should attend the session by all means. There should be a unanimity of sentiment all over the state for the opening up of industries and performance of all work that can be used to improve the state and at the same time afford employment to those coming back from the battle-fronts and sailing the seas. Hillsboro and Forest Grove have substantial delegations, and they have a big county to represent. Let no man shirk his plain duty. The Argus would suggest that the Mayors of the two cities also attend at least one day's session.

Senator Lodge, one of the reactionary senators, is doing his level best to stultify his country by assailing Wilson in his efforts at peace making of the proper order, and it is only what is to be expected from gentlemen of his ilk. He is ably seconded, is Lodge, by Mr. Philander Knox, who misrepresents Pennsylvania in the senate. But the Argus is of the opinion that Wilson and his ideas of government will live when the memory of Lodge and Knox has faded to nothingness. The only fly in the ointment is that the junkers in France and England are too likely to adver-

tise these gentry as exponents of what Uncle Sam really represents in its governmental life.

By the time next Fall rolls around Washington County will get its first real experience with a hard surface road between Forest Grove and Portland. What this will mean to a densely populated community will be worth while, for it will mean extensive road building hereafter, as soon as people realize the worth of the highways that can be travelled Winter and Summer. There is no propaganda so much of real worth for road building as a good highway, and while hard surface can not be built at this time on the laterals it will mean at least a demand for better than dirt roads in order that producers may reach the main arteries.

There is a decided improvement in the real estate situation in this section, so far as farm holdings are concerned and already several farms have changed hands since the armistice. While the war was on farmers had but little desire to make a change from the East to the West, but now that peace is here we shall have hundreds of home hunters in the West. The fact that we are to have a paved artery into the county from the largest city on the North coast, will always be a help to realty holders and farmers in Washington County.

An authority in the Review of Reviews says that the Flu epidemic has cost us mortality to the extent of 300,000—or five times the number of our men lost in the war. The deaths have been percentage among the adults, the children not having suffered so much.

The Northern Pacific, the big liner which operated from Astoria to San Francisco up to the outbreak of the war was run aground about 40 miles out from New York City, New Year's morning. The vessel is in a dangerous position, but the Navy Department thinks they will get her off the reef. The passenger list contains 2400 soldiers and marines, many of whom are on the disability list. It is not known whether or not there are any Oregon wounded aboard. The Navy Department expects to get the passenger list off by tonight.

## TELLS OF SPREAD

Dr. Seely, State Health Officer, speaking of the spread of influenza says:

"About three days after any unusual mixing or massing of people affording close contact there is an increase in the number of cases reported. Thus we find each Tuesday high following Saturday's exposures. After each of the peace celebrations and also following Halloween there was a sharp increase on the three days' schedule. December 28 there was another high point following Christmas exposures. We may expect another high point about January 3 or 4, following New Year's celebration.

About five days after an increase in the number of cases there is an increase in the number of deaths.

The disease is mostly spread by those who have it so mild they scarcely know they are sick, and by those who have recently recovered. How long a case remains a carrier is not definitely determined, but the general opinion at the meeting of the American Health Association put it at about three weeks. All county and city health officers are notified to quarantine cases sufficiently long so far as to be reasonably sure they are no longer carriers.

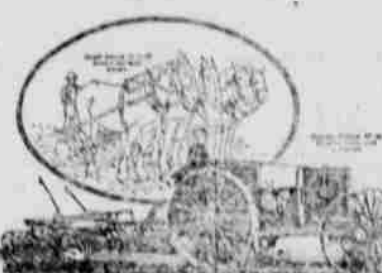
