A GREAT CHARACTER

Theodore Roosevelt is dead. He was a great character—the living exemplification that a man can be born to riches and still make his life a constant fight for ideals and, incidentally, for self, for it is thro "self" that great things are done, sometimes in the singular, and sometimes in the plural. Roosevelt, the man, was born to wealth, and from early manhood had that wealth at his command. Rather than be an idler, which he scorned beyond description, he became a politician and student. He made bitter enemies. Controlled always, in connection with his high ideals, with an ego that knew no bounds, he steadily forced his convictions on the American public. He was an iconoclast from Alpha to Omega. Men loved him or fought him as he fought for or against their convictions. He was full of dynamics, and as to results was clearly a success for himself. Unique and isolated as to character, he made himself felt wherever he went. His one great fault was that he was endowed with the opinion that no other man could do quite so well along the same line of effort as he, himself, could do. He was a patriotic American at all times, but so severely did he hold to his own estimate of things that he many times retarded true reforms when only others in high position could effect them.

He will live in history, as a man created by nature to do great things. He has shown that a man can be surrounded by wealth and still accomplish things for his fellows and for his country. His personal touch was a charm. He switched from friendship to enmity easily when his own personal ideas were involved or his own preference was threatened. Witness his attack on Mr. Taft in 1912. When President he was possessed of a more valued balance than as a private citizen—witness his careful conduct as our chief executive. He brushed opposition to his ideas away as violently as the hurricane tears down buildings. Taken by and large, while he never appreciated the common touch so fully as he might, had

he known the democracy of our common schools, he was essentially a democrat, because he realized that a statesman lived only in plaudit for good deeds. His illness of the past few years made him intolerant of opposition of opinion and personality, and yet no man questioned his undying patriotism and his genuine worth as an American citizen. His radical opposition to those at the helm of government, over detail, made him the object of bitter attacks, and his own bitter shafts met with attacks in kind.

As his ashes return to ashes, and dust returns to dust, all his faults are buried and his virtues are banked with the flowers of fellowship and esteem. He never lost the "common touch," and this it was that has endeared him to millions. He proved that riches should not immunize one from the ardor of intensive citizenship, and if his labors at times became offensive, people shrugged their shoulders and said—"It is Theodore's way."

He was militant to the last, and died in the harness—a man with a great heart, a great character, full of strange contradictions, loved by his friends, and fought by his enemies, even when he and those enemies were often fighting for the same common ends. Strange though it may be, in years ago, an advocate of a League of Nations to preserve peace, by his great bolt in 1912 he made possible the election of the man, Mr. Wilson, who today fights for that same League, with his back to the wall, in Europe. "May he rest well By the shore Whereon he loved to dwell." As a husband and parent Roosevelt especially illumined the sanctity of the home and its life. His pride in his sons was as great and glorious as that of the humble cotter for his own—and this is one of the many reasons his political enemies regard him with esteem.

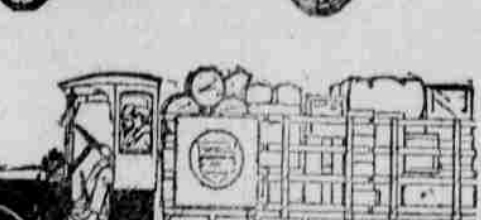
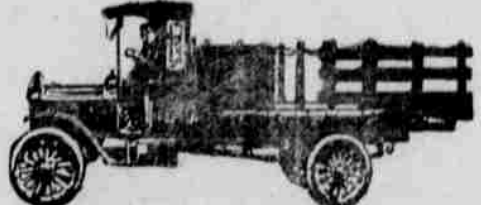
