PETER JANSEN

Peter Jansen, who died at Verboort, Jan. 21, 1919, at 11:30 a. m., was born in Depere, Wisconsin, March 7, 1853. He was married to Johanna Hendrix, Jan. 28, 1875, in Wisconsin, and his wife coming to Oregon with him in a month of marriage, settling on the Henry Black donation, at Verboort, where both lived until death came. To the union were born fourteen children, thirteen of whom survive—Albert, William, Mrs. John Kindell, Mrs. J. A. Vandehy, all of Verboort; Mrs. Martin Vandehy and John Jansen, Hillsboro; Mrs. Oliver F. Roway, Tigard; Sister M. Louise, St. Mary's Institute, Beaverton; Mrs. Earl Ingram, Mrs. Ed. Fessler, Mrs. H. E. Stevenson, Mrs. Earl Reese, of Portland, and Martin J., at home. His grandchildren number thirty-five.

Mrs. Jansen died April 9, 1897 and later Mr. Jansen was married to Mrs. Louie Vandecoevering, who with the following children by a former marriage, survives—Henry and John, at Camp Lewis; Frank, Lucy and Philip, at home. Mr. Jansen had one son, Martin J., in the service, receiving his honorable discharge Jan. 11. Four service stars were in the Jansen window, one for his own son and three for the surviving widow's sons, Henry and John Vandecoevering, and a son-in-law, H. E. Stevenson.

Mr. Jansen was widely known in North Washington County and was held in the highest esteem by a large circle of friends, who appreciated his rugged honesty and sincerity of character.

The funeral took place from the Verboort Catholic Church last Friday, at 10 in the morning, Father VanClarenbeck conducting the service.

Deceased was a member of the Catholic Order of Foresters.

WILLIAM C. KULISCH

William C. Kulisch, for a number of years a well-known traveling salesman of Portland, died January 19, at Tacoma, Wash., following an attack of influenza.

Mr. Kulisch was born in Aberdeen, S. D., on October 9, 1865, and came to Oregon with his parents when he was 7 years old. He has resided in Portland ever since.

With a capital of a few pennies he entered into business for himself as newsboy at the age of 8 years. In course of time he had saved enough of the profits from this little business, and for a number of years was the partner of the late J. G. Schmidt, at Elmonia, where they had a general store for several years. He remained in the grocery business until four years ago when he became a traveling salesman for the H. J. Heinz Co. He held his position up to the time of his last illness.

Mr. Kulisch is survived by his widow, Helen O. Kulisch, and three children, William, Jack and Helen Kulisch; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. Kulisch; two brothers, R. E. and C. A. Kulisch, and two sisters, Mrs. Clara Stewart and Mrs. Louise Callander, all of Portland.

NEED ACCOUNTANTS

Washington, D. C., January 28—The war is practically ended, but war work is not. The tremendous labor of the details of adjusting the accounts and paying the bills will occupy the time of a large force for many months to come. The Ordnance Department at entrance salaries ranging from \$2,200 to \$4,200 a year; 300 junior cost accountants at entrance salaries ranging from \$1,200 to \$2,000 a year; and 300 clerks qualified in accounting at entrance salaries ranging from \$1,000 to \$1,800 a year, for service at ordnance establishments throughout the United States and in the headquarters at Washington, D. C.

The collection of the income tax also calls for the employment of an additional number of accountants. The income tax unit of the Bureau of Internal Revenue is in need of a number of traveling auditors and resident auditors at entrance salaries ranging from \$1,800 to \$4,500 a year.

All these positions are open to both men and women.

The United States Civil Service Commission is receiving applications for these positions. Applications will not be required to report at any place for examination, but will be rated upon their physical ability, education, training and experience, based upon the sworn statements in their applications and upon corroborative evidence adduced by the Commission. Application blanks and full information may be obtained from the secretary of the local board of civil service examiners at the post office or custom house in any city, or by communicating with the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.

COUNTY AGENT'S NOTES

How to Get the Ground Squirrel

The ground squirrel or gray digger, which is common in this county can best be gotten rid of or held in control by the use of poison, if used at the right time. This squirrel usually keeps well under cover in the winter, but during the first warm days of spring they come out in search of food. Often this occurs as early as the latter part of January or during the month of February. Since there is little food for them at this time they accept poison baits much more readily, though baits are made so palatable and attractive that they are taken at any season of the year.

It has been found that the squirrel is possessed of a good deal of enviousity, and when he finds hulled grains, as barley or oats, he desires to husk it out and find what is inside. This principally is made use of in making poison mixtures, barley being preferred.

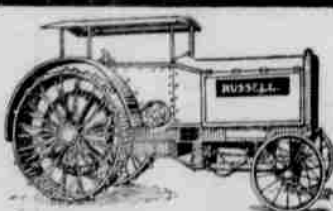
Preparation should be made for extermination of the squirrels that emerge this spring, and the office of the County Agent can furnish the formula for a mixture which should not cost over 20¢ per quart, or in case serious infestation the Agent will arrange to mix large quantities of poison.
