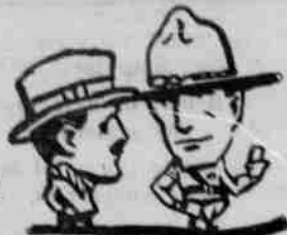

It is reported on good authority that 8,349 carloads of logs came in over the Tillamook line during the year of 1918, and that the board measure of the shipments totalled over 58 million feet. This was exclusive of the spruce shipments, which, of course, were not inconsiderable.

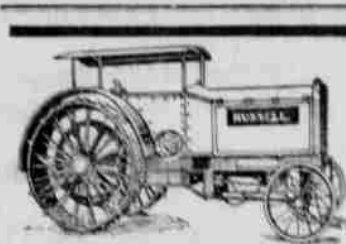
