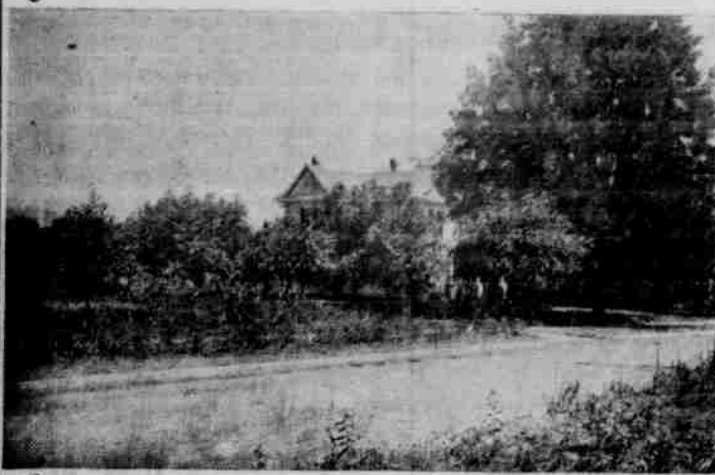

A Membership Drive for the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce has been launched by John L. Etheridge, of Portland, State Chairman of the Membership Committee.

During the past month an office force, working overtime, has been perfecting the Committees Organization for securing members for the new Chamber. A large room has been set aside specially for this purpose by Mr. Etheridge, Manager and Vice President, Morris Bros., Inc., Bond House, in the Morris Bldg., 309 Stark St., Portland.

The aim is to secure Individual Memberships from the representative citizens of every town, community and rural district of Oregon, and Organization Memberships from every local, commercial or development body.

"Every citizen who has anything at stake in the State of Oregon, or who has an interest in the progress and development of his own section, or of the state as a whole, will be interested in the State Chamber of Commerce," said Chairman Etheridge. "Every organization whose purpose it is to advance the development of its local community or of the entire state should be affiliated.

"There are three classes of Memberships: First, Commercial, comprising local Chambers of Commerce and Commercial Clubs; second, Association, being associations organized for promoting any industrial, agricultural or other industries and not organized for private purposes; and finally, the Individual, non-voting Memberships. The annual fee for the Commercial Membership is \$10 for each one hundred members and \$10 additional for each additional fraction thereof. The fee for Association Memberships is \$20 per year. An annual minimum fee of \$5 is to be paid by the Individual non-voting members.

HERE YOU ARE!

The Pacific International Live-stock Exposition will build a modern exposition building in Portland for the purpose of housing stock at their annual shows. The money has been pledged, and Washington County is expected to take \$2,550 of stock. Thos. Carmichael is the director for Washington County, and the state at large is expected to raise \$31,550, and subscriptions will be raised all over Washington, Idaho and Montana, and Portland has promised to raise dollar for dollar for every one subscribed in all that territory. The stock building is to be artificially lighted and to have all modern conveniences. Mr. Carmichael will get busy at once to enlist support from Washington County stockmen. The campaign is to start Feb. 24 and last a week.

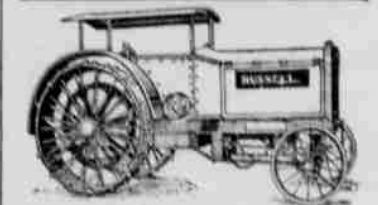
