THE BIG REVIVAL

Since the last announcement appeared in this paper concerning the Baptist revival, more room was needed, and so the campaign has gone to the M. E. building with the Methodist and Christian Church co-operating. It is safe to predict from the interest that is manifest at the present moment and from the splendid crowds that are attending, that a big victory is assured for Hillsboro.

The crowd of women which filled the main auditorium for the meeting to women only last Sunday afternoon was a great surprise to all, and the capacity crowd which packed the building Sunday night was a greater surprise still.

Evangelist Linden is spending this week explaining what the Christian life is so that those who may be influenced to hit the trail later will know just exactly what they are doing. The subject to-night will be "The Cure for Doubt and Unbelief," and on Friday night "The Value of a Soul."

A unique program, the like of which was never seen in town will be given at 7:30 o'clock on Saturday night, by the Boosters, an organization of Hillsboro boys and girls about one hundred strong. It will consist of a program of songs, stunts and yells, and it will be free to everybody. All are cordially invited, and in fact you are urged to be present in order to encourage the boys and girls of the town with a large audience in their first effort as Boosters. It will be a program worth while, and no one can afford to miss it. Since a capacity crowd will fill the building, the advice is given to come early and avoid the rush. The doors will be open at 7 p. m. This will be the best show in town and will cost you nothing—don't forget to come.

Next Sunday will be a great day in the campaign. At nine a. m. the church bells will ring, calling people to prayer in their own homes, asking God's blessings upon the day. At 9:45 a. m. there will be a co-operative Sunday School meeting in the M. E. building, led by Evangelist Linden. All Sunday Schoolers, teachers, officers and students, should take note of this fact and make it a point to be at this meeting and sit together as schools and classes. At 11 a. m. Evangelist Linden will preach to everybody on the subject: "The Buns, Ibs, I Cant's, Which Destroy Usefulness." This is a subject of vital importance for everybody, and all are cordially invited, and all members of the co-operating churches from the oldest to the youngest should, and must, be present at this service. The Evangelist is very urgent and emphatic that all members should come to this morning service. At 3 p. m. there will be a sermon to men and boys only—"Men's Yellow Streaks; or Quit Your Meanness," and at 7:30 p. m. there will be a rousing service for everybody, and the Evangelist will preach on "The Unpardonable Sin." Jesus says concerning this sin, that the who commit it have no forgiveness in this life or the life to come.

A sermon which will be of great interest to everybody will be preached Monday night, on the subject, "Amusements," in which the Evangelist discusses the product of the theatre, cards and dance. It is a sermon, safe, sane and sound, but does not spare the evils in the above, and is delivered in the spirit of deep seriousness, but is also full of fun and frolic. All who indulge in one or even in all of the above should not fail to hear the Evangelist on this night. He will offer no embarrassments to anybody who indulges and he earnestly asks that all card players, theatre goers, and dancers give him a hearing on this vital question. There is going to be a special reservation made for the High School on this night, who are invited to sit together in this section in a body.

Meetings will be held every night next week, including Monday and Saturday nights. This campaign will come to a close with the service Sunday evening, March 9. The time is short, and going fast, and all who have not heard Evangelist Linden should get busy at once and do so. He preaches a manly and virile Gospel which will interest all.
