Governor Withycombe will long be remembered by his most intimate friends as a man of genial disposition, a good heart, and a steadfastness of purpose to stand by his friends. As governor he was often jeered between his desire to serve those who had been steadfast in his support, and the exactions of practical politicians, and this naturally was trying to a man of his disposition. Here at his old home, where men best understood him, he will ever be remembered as a man of sterling worth and a fixed integrity; a splendid citizen and a good neighbor.

The country is more than likely to remember the filibuster of the high-handed in the United States Senate who held up last days legislation to satisfy their spleen against President Wilson. More and more it is apparent that the constitution of the United States will in the not distant future be changed so that the powers of the upper house of Congress will not be greater than that of the House. And this will come if direct legislation hits the country—and some of these days it will. And then there will be more of valuable legislation and much less of a partisan nature.

The late Gov. Withycombe will long be remembered as the man who in and out of season preached the building up of Oregon soil, and the use of clover as a great fertilizer. When others contended that we had too wet a climate for this crop the Governor insisted that this was the real home of clover, and he incessantly hammered away on the subject. He finally won out and today clover sowing has been the

salvation of hundreds and thousands of farms which had gone to seed through lack of rotation in crops.

As the result of a conference with Representative Hare this week the situation of the road question in Oregon is reviewed in this issue of the paper. Every reader should read this, and gain an idea of what is in store for the people of Oregon. The Argus thinks that the Washington County delegation in the legislature has served the interests of their constituency in an able manner.

When that state highway is paved between here and Portland this first county in dairy industry is going to sit up and take notice.

Trappers are warned that the pelts should only be sent during those dates, as moths often develop in the pelts when held at the office for a longer period.

Attention is also called to the fact that pelts must be strung together and tagged with name and address of sender. In stringing the pelts it is well to place them in pairs with fur side out.

Returns have just been received for the pool held last month, the 500 pelts bringing a fraction over 20 cents each.

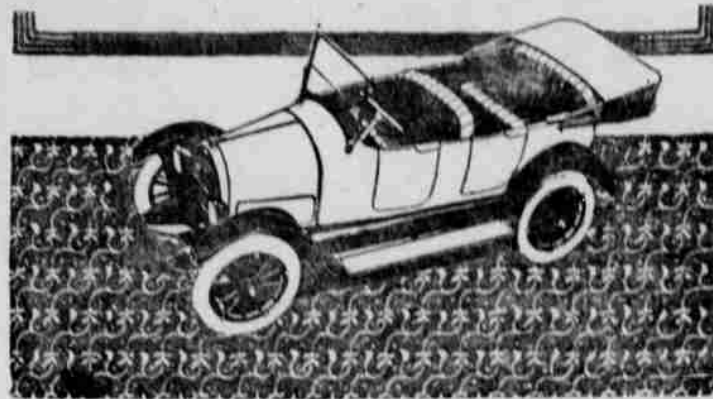
Sunday will be the last day of the campaign. The church bells will ring again at nine o'clock, calling all the people to prayer in their homes.
