

**GET RICH QUICK—GROW BERRIES**

To the Farmers of the Hillsboro District:

For several months we have been conducting an active campaign among growers for the purpose of securing a very large planting in strawberries, raspberries, loganberries, gooseberries and currants. We pointed out the enormous profits to the producer. The response has been very encouraging. We have booked large orders for tips and plants and our stock is almost exhausted. In another month Spring will be here and growers should make preparations to get their ground in shape for planting new acreage.

Our jelly, jam and preserve plant is in full operation, but we must have berries of every variety to keep us occupied all the year around. We persistently pointed out to growers the enormous profits to be derived from small fruits, how it would add value to your land and how it was possible to make the Willamette Valley famous as the greatest berry district in the United States. The opportunity, not alone to make large profits but to put the Willamette Valley on the map rests entirely with the progressive growers. We are doing our full duty to bring this about. We have already spent over \$400,000.00 in advertising your products; have invested \$1,350,000.00 in this business; have established an extensive system of selling jellies, jams and preserves throughout the world and now appeal to the growers to furnish the necessary fruit, which is so essential to mutual success.

**Raspberries**—We will contract the yield from 1000 acres of raspberries of the Cuthbert variety for 3 to 5 years. To the growers who have raspberries in bearing we will pay 9 1/2¢ cents per pound, which is equal to \$500 to \$600 gross per acre. Beats raising hay or grain. Does it not?

**Loganberries**—When we speak of loganberries, we think of Lo-Ju, America's famous beverage, and Phez, America's famous pure juice of the loganberry; then we think of loganberry jellies, jams and preserves for which there is a constantly increasing demand. We can use the product of 1000 acres for 5 years at prices which will net \$150 per acre, when planted on the right kind of land. This is one of the Willamette Valley's best berries on account of its productiveness and long life. There are several patches 18 years old and still producing bumper crops. We can arrange to furnish you with strong, vigorous plants at \$15 per 1000 through growers, if your order is placed at once.

**Gooseberries and Currants**—These much neglected but splendid berries are again being sought after, and growers who have large or small patches should give them careful attention. There will be a good demand for them this year and for years to come.

Let us again impress upon you the importance of the industry. The Oregon Legislature, which just closed, passed an extensive and comprehensive re-education program to take care of our returning soldiers, sailors and marines and develop the industrial and commercial wealth of Oregon. We are doing our part and are presenting opportunities which we feel certain will contribute to the well-being and happiness of our people.

**\$60 BONUS**

The sum of \$60, bonus, will be paid to soldiers discharged since April 6, 1917.

Section 1406 of the Revenue Act, approved February 24, 1919, authorizes the payment of a bonus of \$60 to officers, soldiers, field clerks and nurses of the Army upon honorable separation from active service by discharge, resignation or otherwise. This bonus is not payable to the heirs or representatives of any deceased soldier.

Those who are discharged hereafter will receive this bonus on the same roll or voucher upon which they are paid their final pay.

Those who have been discharged and have received their final pay without the \$60 bonus, should write a letter to the Zone Finance Officer, Lemon Building, Washington, D. C., stating their service since April 6, 1917, the date of last discharge and their present address to which they desire their bonus checks to be sent and enclosing with this letter their discharge certificate or military order for discharge and both, if both were issued.

Upon the receipt by the Zone Finance Officer, Washington, D. C., of this information and the soldier's discharge certificate, this officer will cause checks to be drawn and mailed to the claimants in the order in which their claims were received by him. The discharge certificate will be returned to the soldier with the check.

It is estimated that at least one million and a quarter persons have been discharged from the service who are entitled to the benefits of this Act, and while payments will be made as expeditiously as practicable, it will manifestly take considerable time to write and mail this many checks.

This will be good news to the many ex-soldiers of this locality.

**COUNTY SCHOOL NOTES**

On account of war conditions during the past two years improvements and repairs of school property have been unavoidably neglected in many places. With a return to normal times, school boards and patrons are beginning to take up these matters with a view to make up for lost time.

The Fern Hill district has voted \$700 to move the school house across the road to a more suitable site of a full acre, and to make their building modern with respect to lighting and heating and standard according to the state rules.

The Watts school has a new library case and dictionary, and has arranged to make needed repairs and improvements to put it again on the standard list.

The meeting of the Washington County Teachers' Association at Forest Grove Saturday, March 22, should be of interest to members of school boards and parents. All are invited.

A standard industrial club is a club of five or more children all taking the same project and organized by electing a President, Vice President and Secretary, and securing some older person to act as an Advisor.

The Metzger school is in the lead with three standard clubs, a sewing club with 18 members, a big project with 10 members and a garden project with 18 members. Hillside has a sewing club with 10 members. Bacon has a sewing club with 5 members. We have club enrollments from the following districts—Tualatin, Verboort, South Tualatin, Mountaineer, Iowa Hill, Lyda, Oak Park, Garden Home, Hazeldale, Wilson. Some of these will probably organize standard clubs later.
