Hugh Rogers says that the tim-
ber operators on the P. R. & N.

February, but a snowfall drove
them back to Portland. A record

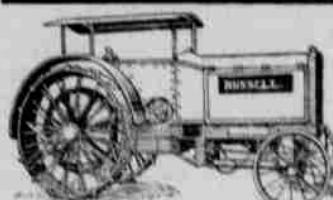
