IN MEMORY

SQUIRREL CAMPAIGN

Numerous reports have been received at the County Agent's office regarding the effectiveness of the campaign against ground squirrels which is now being waged in this county. Among them, Mr. B. H. Recher, southwest of Forest Grove, who with his neighbors purchased 20 quarts of poisoned barley a few weeks ago, states that there are now no squirrels in their neighborhood.

Over 500 quarts of this material have been prepared and distributed in the county and much more will be distributed before May 1st.

Fertilizer Trials

The farmers of Beaverton, Scholls, Laurel, Blooming, Dille and Kansas City are planning to make trials of the value of fertilizers on corn and potatoes this season. With assistance of the County Agent plots will be measured off on which 200 pounds per acre of super phosphate will be applied and on other plots blood meal will be applied at the same rate, and a combination of the two fertilizers at the same rates of application will also be tried. The value of super phosphate has already been demonstrated in this county and is found to be of value, especially on red hill soils, beaverdam soils and land that has been cropped to grain for a number of years.

Sheep Growers to Meet

The farmers of Scholls, under the leadership of A. B. Flint and Ferd Groner, are planning a meeting of sheep men of that community about May 10th, at which time Mr. Nelson, of the Agricultural College will be asked to explain the different market grades of wool and also to show how to prepare the clipped wool for market. It has been found that many fleeces are poorly graded due to the poor handling of the fleece after it has been clipped.

At this meeting, Mr. Nelson will shear one or two sheep and show how to roll the fleeces in order to get the best market grades, and also have samples of the different market grades of wool which will clearly show how the fleeces are graded.

was that the tragedy was due to carelessness on the part of young Vest, as well as recommending that the character of the covered bridge be immediately remedied. Benton Bowman accompanied Coroner Limber and took notes of the evidence.

The inquest was held at the Schamoni place, close to the scene of the accident. The coroner's jury returned the following verdict:

"We, the jury empanelled by the Coroner of Washington County, Oregon, to inquire into the cause of death of Geo. Racette, deceased, find that said Geo. Racette died at Tigard on April 20, 1919, as the result of being accidentally struck down and run over by an automobile driven by one James Leslie Vest, and we find that said accident was caused by the carelessness of said James Leslie Vest, and we recommend that he be held to await the action of the grand jury of this county, and we further recommend that the dangerous character of the bridge where the fatality occurred should be immediately remedied.—(Signed) J. S. Blankenship, W. C. Charter, Roy Carnes, M. Frank Bishop, G. L. Sparks, R. J. DeBahr."

Young Vest was released on bail furnished by his father and friends, shortly after the return of the verdict.

George Racette was a former resident of Vancouver, and he moved there from Kankakee, Ill., 35 years ago. Five years ago he moved to Tigard. He is survived by his wife, two sons, Emil and Louis, and three daughters, Mrs. Sophia Fisher, Mrs. Eva Siegel and Miss Leona Racette, at home.

Young Vest, who is under arrest, has a record in Portland, and was recently released after serving a sentence for burglary.
