NOW THAT WAR TAX

Commencing with today, the ice cream parlors will begin to contribute to the war tax, and this, of course, will affect the consumer. For every nickel drink, or nickel sale of ice cream, or the usual dime sale, the government gets a penny; for a fifteen-cent sale, or twenty-cent sale, two cents. If a party treats to a usual dollar's worth of refreshments he contributes ten cents. Where the purchases are individual, however, the government, on a dollar's sale, would get twenty cents toward diminishing the war debt. Some of the confectioners are putting out a smaller cone of ice cream and charging five cents for it, paying the tax themselves. Here is where old Dan Cupid gets a crack on the cocon.

ALSO MILITARY TRAINING

Eighth Grade Grads to Celebrate
Here June 24

The meeting of the Washington County Teachers' Association, at Beaverton, Saturday, April 26th, was one of the best meetings of the year. Lieut.-Colonel Leader gave a talk on the Battle of Marne and one on physical and military training. His addresses were both interesting and instructive. Prof. Thos. H. Gottle, of Monmouth, spoke on the study of reading and the transition from grades to high school. Mrs. Ida Mae Smith, of Monmouth, gave two periods of instruction in primary work. A feature of the program was a demonstration of the use of moving pictures for school work.

About 150 teachers and a few school board members were present and all felt well repaid for attendance. This is the last meeting of the association for this school year.

A county eighth grade graduation will be celebrated in Hillsboro on June 24th. The diplomas will be presented at that time to those passing at the May and June examinations.

Sherwood, Middleton and Cipole districts have petitions out for the formation of a union high school district. Banks and surrounding districts are considering the same proposition. Both these sections are quite isolated from high school privileges, and really need standard high schools.

The Mountaineer school held a picnic last Friday evening, securing \$78 to be used in improvements needed in the school.

The Prickett school basket social Friday evening netted over \$90. The teacher and some of the older pupils were on Monday spending it for things needed in the school. The Prickett school board met with the County Supt. at the school house Monday, planning improvements. The lighting system will be changed and everything done necessary to make their school standard. A play shed and gravity water system are also being considered.

The Washington Co. Industrial Club School Fair is now assured. It will be held the Thursday and Friday preceding the state fair. There are sixteen standard industrial clubs now organized, with a membership of 209. Besides this there are about 250 enrolled in individual projects.

BUSINESS MEN IN- AUGURATE LUNCHEON

Hold Initial Meeting Tuesday, at
Hotel Washington

TO MEET IN TWO WEEKS

Idea is to Promote Community of
Interest in Public Affairs

The first noonday luncheon by the business men of the city was held at the Hotel Washington, Tuesday noon. Chas. F. Wells, Chairman, briefly outlined the necessity of the business interests of the city getting together for the discussion and consideration of affairs that touch upon the welfare of the city, and related how the Hillsboro Club, at the suggestion of a member, had concluded to try out this feature. He dwelt upon the fact that Hillsboro is getting to be a real live town; low traveling salesmen from all over the Northwest were telling everywhere of Hillsboro's wonderful prospects and its big trade; mentioned that we were soon to have a State Highway paved past our gates; that we would soon have a big State Grange meeting, and, this fall, school fair, and possibly after this year an annual county fair of some proportions—and he, like others, felt that we should "meet and reason together," talk over situations and be prepared to meet any emergency.

Mayor Wall was called on to express himself and he offered his assistance in every way possible. R. R. Easter sanctioned the spirit of the occasion and A. C. Shute pledged his support. W. W. Boscow thought we should keep a luncheon idea going, and said that he was ready to "put in" with the business men at every opportunity to make this a bigger and better Hillsboro. W. O. Donelson told how he and some other business men had secured the appearance of Dr. Samuel Gray, noted civic lecturer, to appear here for two or three business talks, and he felt that the effort was well repaid.

Dr. Samuel Gray, upon invitation of Chairman Wells, delivered a half-hour talk that was a whirlwind of interest. Dr. Gray had lectured the evening before at the M. E. Church, and he has a national reputation as a "city builder." He is in demand on Chautauqua platforms, and knows the publicity game from start to finish.

His lecture, while necessarily short, was well received and many a business man who had heretofore looked upon his opponent as a "foreigner" concluded after all that he was as much interested in the present and future of the city as himself.
