APHIS UNLIKELY

That a serious infestation of the aphid this year during the growing season is unlikely and at this time seems almost impossible, is the expert opinion of the Entomologists of the U. S. Station of Forest Grove and also of Corvallis, whose reports have been received at the County Agent's office.

The enormous numbers of lady bugs and sweat bees that came through the winter and which feed on the young aphids, will prevent any serious damage to the grain fields during the growing season, and it is unlikely that there will be any serious attack during the year though it would not be impossible for the lady bugs to die off during the summer, due to lack of food and thus give the aphid a start which would make them more numerous in the fall.

Dipping Potatoes

Dipping seed potatoes has been the practice of some of the larger growers of Washington County for a number of years. During the past one or two seasons, some of the farmers have been using corrosive sublimate instead of the formalin solution.

Chas. True, of Sherwood, who is growing selected seed potatoes has been practicing the use of the corrosive sublimate for a number of seasons and finds that it gives better results than formalin, and will use it again this year.

The advantage in the use of corrosive sublimate over formaldehyde is in the fact that the latter is only of an advantage in controlling scab while the former will control scab and rhizoctonia, the black scurf, as well. This is a disease that is becoming prevalent in the Willamette Valley, and one which will have to be controlled.

Corrosive sublimate is used 4 ounces to 30 gallons of water, potatoes being soaked in this solution 1 1/2 to 2 hours and dried before planting. The solution is not to be used over 4 times, and is, therefore, enough to soak 12 to 14 bushels.

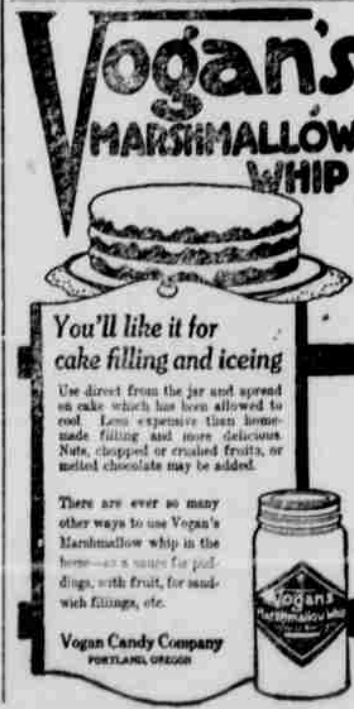
GROW THEM RIGHT

It pays to grow certified seed potatoes. Better quality, yield and price are received. It is profitable even to try for certification if the requirements are followed, because the more careful selection of seed, use of undiseased ground, seed treatment, spraying of plants, and care in harvesting will give a bigger and better crop. Only 12 farmers in all of Oregon grew certified potatoes last year. Those who want to enter this year may get free blanks with bulletin on potato certification by writing to the agricultural college at Corvallis.—O. A. C. Bulletin.

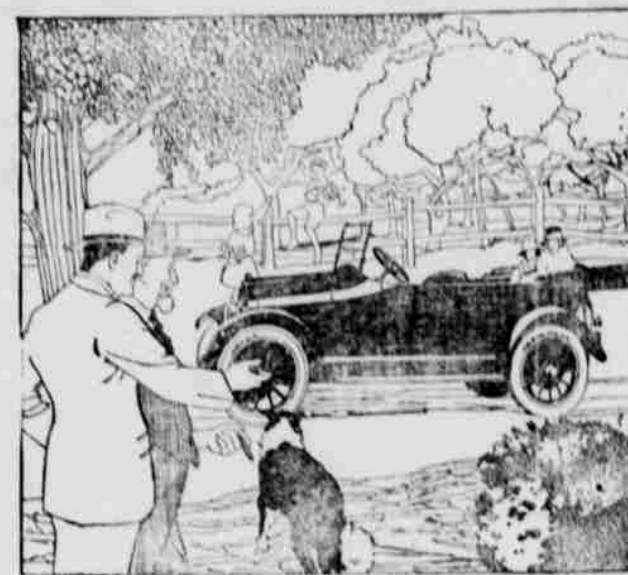
