# CRACK THE MIDGE, SAYS COUNTY AGENT

Tells Men to Cut Clover for Best Results

GET AFTER THE THISTLE

Tells of Satisfactory Methods by Practical Men

The yield of clover seed on the farms of Washington County has seen reduced very much some seasons, and fields have been reported from which practically no seed was harvested. In most cases this was due to the clover flower midge, which is a very small fly that deposits its eggs in the clover blossoms and the larva which hatches feeds on the oung seed. Where both bay and eed are desired the midge can e controlled by cutting the hay at the proper time. Ordinarily if cut not later than the first week of June this first generation will be destroyed and the seed crop will then be free from the pest. Where the crop has been pastured early in the season are must be taken that no blosoms be left after the above date.

In some cases it is advisable to lip such a field to destroy all dossoms. One method of deternining when a hay crop should se cut to control this insect is to xamine the heads and when the iny maggots are found to be arning to a pinkish tint the cutting should not be long delayed.

C. W. Creel and L. P. Lockwood, of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, have made the above investigations and further state that the midge may not be as serious this year as in some years, but constant vigilance is necessary to control.

Canadian Thistles

Canadian Thistles are fast be coming one of the worst weed ests on the Washington County farms, and unless something i done to stop their spread or hold them in check, large areas, as in some of the Eastern States, will be abandoned as far as farming s concerned, and turned over to the thistles. The reason for the seriousness of this weed and at the same time the cause for its difficult eradication, is that the plant not only spreads by seed but also "erceping underground stems which being nourished by ground sometimes travel for a long distance beneath the surface and send up new plants at intervals as they go.

For Large Areas

Where very abundant and over a large area the thistles can probably be best controlled by the bare fallow method. Ferd Groner and Thos. Carmichael have found this method very satsfactory. Mr. Carmichael states that he cradicated the thistles in one season, but had to keep continually at it. Plow the land a the thistles are about to bloom just deeply enough to turn over the root mat. The land should then be harrowed, preferably with a spring-tooth, care being taken not to drag the root to uninfested areas. Cultivation must then be continued throughout the growing season. Usually it is a good plan to follow with a beavy smother crop, as oats and vetch. This crop may be harvested carly, the ground plowed, and planted the second season to a cultivated crop. This crop should be cleanly cultivated never allowing the thistles to appear,

For Small Patches Small patches may be cradicated by grubbing, thus gradually exhausting the stored food supply in the roots, and killing N. C. Jamison.
