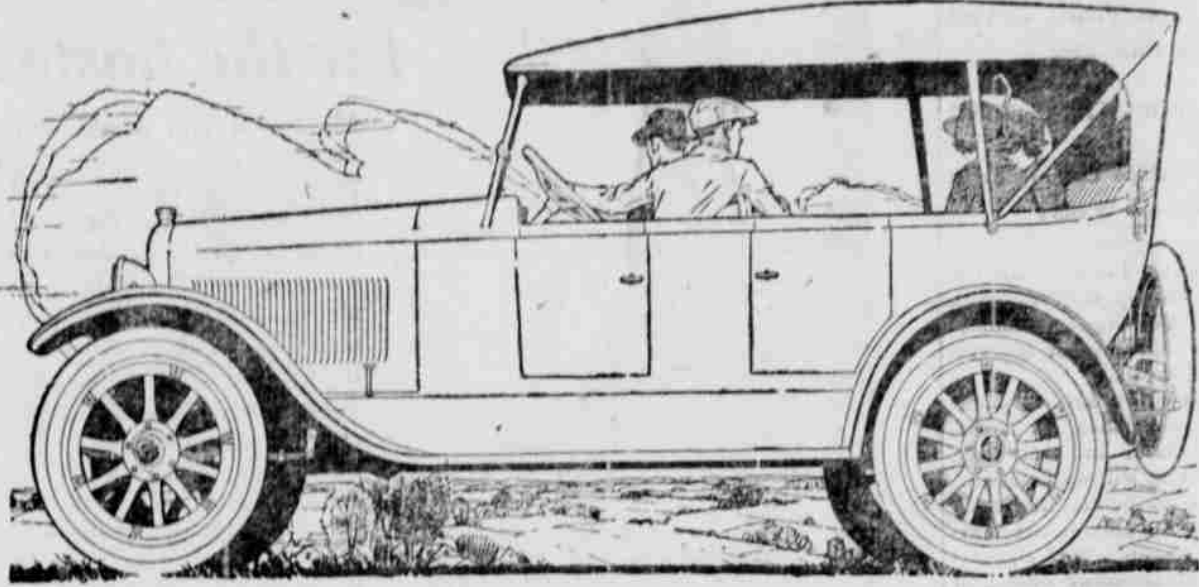

WESTERN FIR

Have you ever stopped to consider what the Douglas fir lumber industry means to labor and business and as a taxpayer?

Oregon and Washington mills have just sold to the Railroad administration 175 million Douglas fir ties to be sent by water to the Atlantic Coast, and mills in the same region have orders for 40 million feet of ties for French and English railroads. These figures mean about 4,333,333 ties for American roads and one million for the foreign market.

The present order for this country alone will furnish ties for about 1,730 miles of tracks which would extend from New York City to Western Nebraska, if a single track were built, and almost from New York to Chicago for a double track. Figure out the number of men this will employ and the wages paid—and Washington County gets its share.

JOHN P. HICKS

John P. Hicks, twenty-five years ago a resident of Hillsboro, died at his residence at 982 East Main St., Portland, May 30, 1919. He leaves his widow, Leah R. Hicks, and the following children to mourn his loss—Ulysses Hicks, Dunsmuir, Cal.; Jos. T. Hicks, Portland; Chas. E. Hicks, Endicott, Wash.; Geo. E. Hicks, of Grants Pass, Ore. Deceased was a veteran of the Civil War and was a member of the Grand Army of the Republic. The funeral was held Saturday in Portland, and interment was in Greenwood Cemetery.

Mr. Hicks formerly owned the Weik place on First St. in this city, and officiated as Justice of the Peace here in the nineties.

HUNDRED FOLD RETURN

The Oregon State Game Warden has been instrumental in increasing the fish hatchery production in Oregon and thus helping build up a great industry, salmon packing.

By the expenditure of a few thousand dollars, Oregon has been enabled to increase the value of fish taken from its streams to millions of dollars annually, thus increasing the assessed valuations of the state, making work for thousands of people and developing can manufacturing, box manufacturing and similar industries. This is a good example of the expenditure of taxpayers money and constructive work which brings back a hundred fold return.

Scientific development of fish hatcheries not only prevents the depletion of the natural fish supply, but increases it. Oregon's example in developing its fish industry can be profitably followed by many states.

About two hundred and fifty attended the Memorial Day exercises held at the Cornelius cemetery, Friday afternoon. Miss Manche Langley of Forest Grove, was the principal speaker of the day and gave a splendid address. The following program was prepared and given under the direction of Mrs. Sarah McNeill, patriotic instructor of the W. R. C.

J. G. Crozier, pastor of the Methodist Church; song, "Battle Hymn of the Republic."

EXCEEDS QUOTA

M. McDonald, county chairman of the Armenian Relief Committee, sends the Argus the following letter, which is self-explanatory:

"May 28, 1919.

Mr. R. E. Parsons, Treasurer, Washington County Armenian Relief Committee, Orenco, Or.
Dear Mr. Parsons:

Please accept our sincere thanks for your remittances now totalling \$5318.27, on Washington County's quota of \$5150 for Armenian Relief. I note with pleasure that other remittances are to be expected, and I wish you would make it clear to all that this fund will be kept open as long as the appalling need continues.

Since January 1st, we have sent four shiploads of supplies, including everything from flour to delousing machines, for they have eoties in Armenia. We have sent 300 workers, including doctors, nurses, carpenters, agriculturists and many others. Sunday's Oregonian publishes a letter from Mrs. Van Etten, of Olympia, Wash., one of these 300 who is now in Constantinople. She says 'The Armenians there try in every way to express their gratitude for our coming. They are convinced it is the dawning of a new era for them, and they certainly have fought steadfastly through years of it.'

Again we are reminded that the relief of these suffering is a most costly affair, as word just reaches us of the death of the twenty-seventh of our relief workers, in the person of Mr. Emrich, whose wife opened the Oregon campaign, last year. The heroism of these men and women is well expressed in a letter just received from Mr. Maynard, who with two others was endeavoring to feed 330,000 refugees in the Caucasus. He says, 'It is wicked to stand by while people slowly starve to death.'
