CANNING CO. IMPROVES

The Hillsboro Canning Co., operated by A. J. Ray & Son, is making big improvements to handle the 1919 season, fruits and vegetables. They have bought a new automatic open cooker with a capacity of 1000 cans per each 8-hour day; a new retort cooker, with double that capacity; a new cherry grader; bean cutter and grader; 2 large exhaust boxes; a 600 gallon syringe, a new 35 H. P. engine to take the place of the old 15 H. P. engine, and have added \$8100 to the warehouse capacity.

A new auto truck will take care of the hauling, and the cannery will soon be ready to start on the cherries.

UNITED TUNNEL CAVES

A section of the United Railway tunnel, near the Cornelius Pass, caved in some time during the morning yesterday, and as a result a gasoline speeder, carrying nine men, was derailed about 700 feet from the west approach. The injured are John Schaefer, of Mountindale, deep cut on top of head, necessitating several stitches; Geo. Hellaire, bruises about the chest; John Uebel, bruised forehead and nose and abrased leg; John Richter, of North Plains, left wrist wrenched, and painful cuts on forehead and nose; C. W. Ohmecht, North Plains, sprained thumb. Foreman P. A. Qualls was twisted and shaken up, but did not come in to receive medical attention. Dr. W. D. Wood did the surgical work on the boys, and while they were serious in a way, their sense of humor was working over time even while John Schaefer was having his crown sewed up—without an anesthetic. Other men on the speeder were O. T. Jackson, Carl W. White and Raymond Westcott.

There are no lights in the tunnel, and the speeder was thrown violently from the track before anyone knew there had been a cave-in.

The injured men were brought to the city in an automobile, and all were able to be sent to their homes.

FRANK STEWART DEAD

Frank Stewart, born and raised in this city, and a graduate of Pacific University, died at his home in Los Angeles, June 11, 1919, aged 41 years. After leaving Pacific, Stewart was in the Portland mail service for several years. Later he went to San Francisco, and having studied law and being admitted to the bar, secured a position as U. S. postal inspector at the Golden Gate City. He served four years at this position and resigned to accept the Deputy U. S. District Attorneyship at Los Angeles. Stewart was a bright lawyer, and had a most pleasing personality. He leaves a widow and three children. A brother, Ernest Stewart, is one of the tellers at the U. S. National Bank, Portland, and another brother, Jesse Stewart, is located at Ranger, Texas.

Say, Boys, let's go to the Banks dance, Saturday night, June 14. The "Singing Fiddler" will be there. Some music.

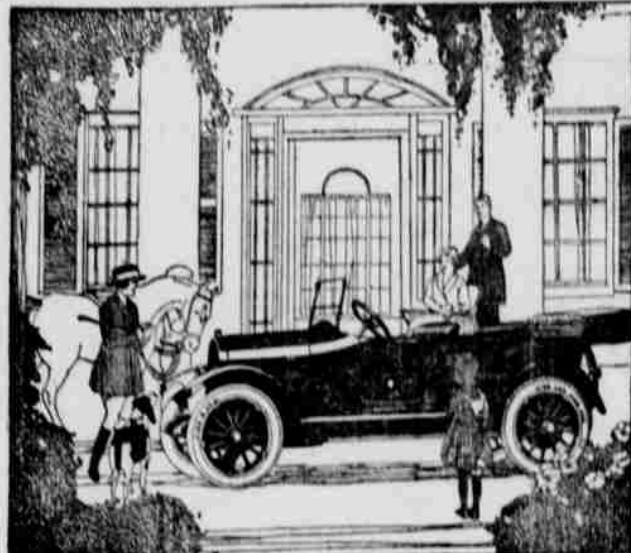
