NEW HERD TROUBLE

Reports have been received that a few of the herds of this county have been attacked with another disease, Hemorrhagic Septicemia. This disease has made its appearance in the county for a number of years, but was not apparent last year. The symptoms of it are usually the running of the blood from the nostrils, and sometimes may be noted by blood spots along the back and inside of the legs. On account of these blood spots it is sometimes known locally as bloody murrin. There is no known cure for the disease at this time, and the best preventative method found is vaccination. It will be advisable for herds having been affected by this disease in former years to vaccinate this season, and herds in the vicinity should also be vaccinated.

W. C. STEWART

Rev. W. C. Stewart died at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Henderson Smith, at Banks, June 13, 1919, after an illness of several months. He was born at Burr Oak, Kansas, Nov. 29, 1882. He was appointed to the pastorate at Banks by Bishop Hughes in 1908, and dedicated the church there. He was pastor there for two years, and during that time the church was built at Roy. During his stay at Banks he popularized himself by associating with the younger element, taking an interest in their athletics and other healthful amusements. His influence over the younger element at Banks and Roy was very beneficial, and the many expressions of regret at his untimely demise afford a splendid testimonial to his usefulness.

He was married on June 15, 1911, to Miss Fern L. Smith, who, with three children, survives. Mrs. Smith gave her husband a splendid co-operation in his church work.

Two years ago Rev. Stewart was transferred to the Columbia River Conference and was given a pastorate at Bend, where he remained until a few months ago, when failing health resulted in his resignation. He had just finished a handsome new home at Bend. Leaving there he went to Mouthout for a short visit with his parents, later coming to Banks, where he passed.

He is survived by his parents, the widow, and three children—Donald Lee, Ethel Genevieve and Charles Lester.

The remains were taken to Salem Saturday, by Undertaker Prickett, and interment was at the capital city.

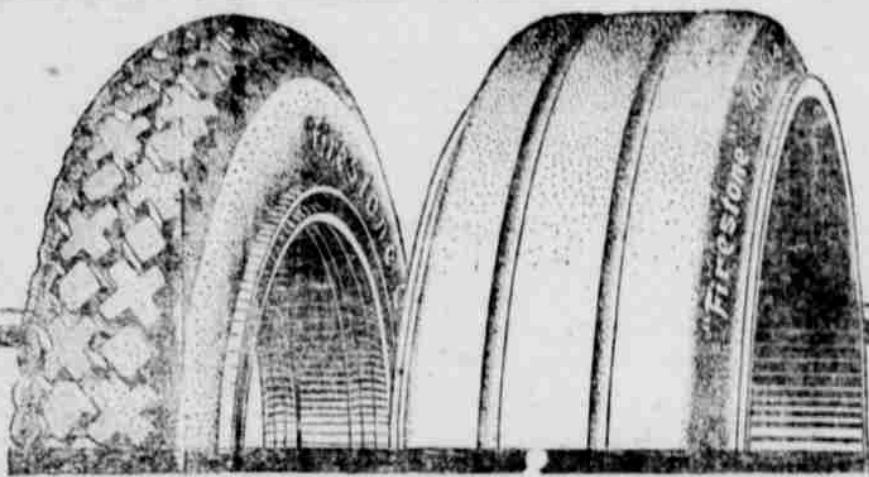
