NAVY PLAYED BIG PART

C. V. Boyd, recently returned from service in the U. S. Navy, says that Uncle Sam's ships-of-war played a much larger part in the war than is generally accepted. It was the Navy that safely conveyed the American troops to the extent of over two million to France, and, strange to say, the Yank vessels never lost a laden transport. The only big loss of this kind was when a convoy was sent around the North of Ireland accompanied by armed



allied vessels, that we lost a troop ship.

Boyd states that the U. S. commanders were always alert, that they never counted on curity, that the submarine chasers and destroyers were always playing on either side, in front of and behind the troop ships, to see that the sea lane was clear to the murderous subs—and this was what really made it possible to get men and supplies across in time to stem the hordes of Germany from cleaning the Allies from France.

Boyd made five trips over to Brest after the armistice was signed.

He says the service is of incalculable value to young men, and broadens them in more ways than one.

Mr. Boyd states that after July 4 he intends opening up the Boyd Machine Shop, on Maple St., where he will be pleased to meet his oldtime customers and give them the best work obtainable.

An American Legion Post was formed in Hillsboro, at the Hillsboro Club Rooms, Tuesday evening. Capt. E. J. Eivers and Capt. Dow V. Walker, of Portland, were out and instituted the Legion. The newly elected officers are Sgt. Francis W. Rollins, President; Sergeant Clifton Bagley, Vice Pres.; Corporal Byron Garrett, Secretary, and Haskell Carter, Treasurer; the executive committee, C. G. Reiter, Zenas Olson and Archie Pitman. The Legion will have a membership booth at the celebration grounds, where service men can sign applications. They met again on Friday, June 27, and all service men are invited, and if enough show up the Post will have a section in the parade July 4.

The purpose of the American Legion is best explained by the preamble to their constitution:

"For God and Country we associate ourselves together for the following purposes:

To uphold and defend the Constitution of the United States of America; to maintain law and order; to foster and perpetuate a one hundred per cent Americanism; to preserve the memories and incidents of our association in the Great War; to inculcate a sense of individual obligation to the community, state and nation; to combat the autocracy of both the classes and the masses; to make right the master of might; to promote peace and good will on earth; to safeguard and transmit to posterity the principles of justice, freedom and democracy; to consecrate and sanctify our comradeship by our devotion to mutual helpfulness."

AUTO MECHANICS

That the motorist may be protected from the inefficiency of untrained automobile mechanics and repair men, and that craftsmen may be protected from inefficient competition, the state board of auto mechanics examiners, created by the last legislature, is distributing application blanks looking to the early examination and licensing of every auto mechanic in the state.

The examining board, E. E. Boggess, president; H. R. Fancher, vice president, and M. L. Gramming, secretary-treasurer, will have its headquarters in Portland, where application blanks may be obtained by addressing Box 761, although applicants for examination may secure blanks from their county clerks, or from local garages. Examinations will be held later in 15 centrally located cities in the state and will cover various specialized activities of auto trades as well as the usual lines of motor repair work.

The board will examine with written, oral and manual tests, prepared. President Boggess declares, in an understandable manner, and the applicant may be examined in any or all subjects for which he, in his opinion, is qualified. Upon completion of the tests the applicant will be rated according to his ability in at least three classes.

Deeming a purely theoretical examination unfair to many excellent mechanics who have had no theoretical training, such tests be omitted. The classification of mechanics will serve the dual purpose of giving credit where credit is due and to act as an incentive to others to increase their knowledge and efficiency in their crafts.

Mechanics who fail to take the examination will be subject to a penalty of \$100. The examination fee will be \$5.
