BREEDERS TO ORGANIZE

A movement is on foot to organize into associations the breeders of the different breeds of dairy stock that is raised in this county. Though no figures are available it is believed that there are more breeders of pure-bred live stock in Washington County than in any other county in the state and should these men be organized they could in a short time make Washington County known as a center for high-class pure bred stock.

Organization meetings will be held about the middle of the month, dates for which will be announced later.

The Jersey breeders, under the leadership of A. E. Wescott, Wm. Schulmerich, Geo. Biersdorf, J. J. VanKleeck, Geo. Withycombe, and a number of other breeders of equal note, as strong a Jersey organization can be established in this county as in any other county in the state. The Jersey men wish to be organized especially on account of the Jersey Jubilee, which will be held next year, and through their organization they believe it can be brought to this county, and not be passed up again as was the case this year.

The Holstein men are likewise anxious to see all the breeders of blacks and whites together in one organization, so that the breed may be better advertised and that sales will thereby be made possible. Frank Connell, W. N. Hathorn, Thos. Carmichael and Frank Peerenboom are among the number of Holstein breeders that will back the organization.

With the remarkable record of the Clackamas County Guernsey Breeders Association ever before them, the Guernsey breeders of the county are also planning to get together. The Clackamas County organization has disposed of two carloads of stock and has received considerable advertising. This county has almost as many Guernseys and has made practically as many sales, but the lack of an organization has lost this valuable advertising. W. A. Goodin, Ferd Groner, Henry Hesse, A. B. Flint and James Batchelder are among the Guernsey breeders who desire an organization in this county.

Speakers from the Oregon Agricultural College will be present at the meetings, dates of which will be announced later.

GERHARDT H. PRANGER

Gerhardt Henry Pranger, well known here and at Leisysville, died June 29, 1919. He was born in Germany, August 20, 1842, and was married to Mary G. Meier, at Carrollton, Ill., Nov. 17, 1868. They resided at Carrollton until 1903, when they moved to Oregon, arriving at Hillsboro on March 25, of that year. They bought the Cap Blanchard place, at Leisysville, later moving to Hillsboro, living at Sixth and Oak Sts. Mr. Pranger came to America when he was 16 years of age, landing at New Orleans. He made his way up the Mississippi by river steamer as far as St. Louis, and was immediately called to enter the Civil War, but before being mustered in the war closed.

Ten children were born to the union, five dying in infancy. The widow and the following children survive—B. J. Pranger, F. L. Pranger, H. E. Pranger, Mrs. Mary Waibel, wife of Wm. Waibel, and Mrs. Anna Sohler, wife of W. J. Sohler, all of Hillsboro. The funeral took place this morning at nine o'clock, from the St. Matthews' Church, the Rev. Father Costello having charge of the Mass. Interment was in the Catholic cemetery. Undertaker Limber conducting.

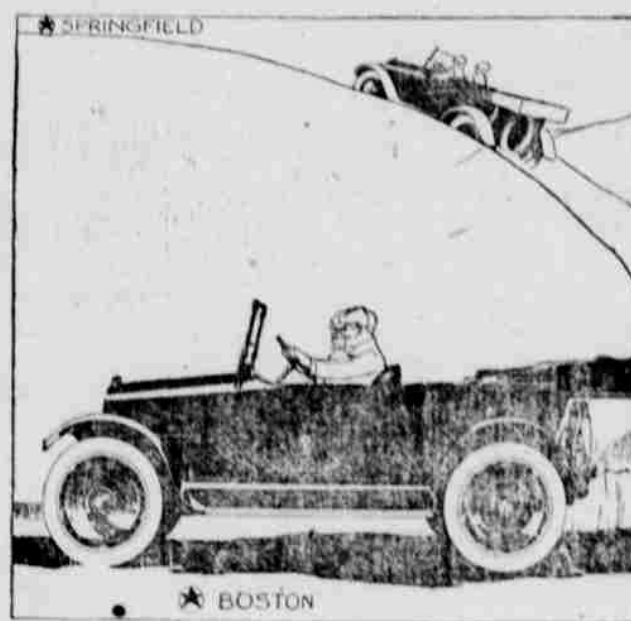
