It is notable that Washington County is getting to the forefront in breeding registered stock, and the county has many exhibits of livestock that would grace any fair. Each year we have stock taking first premiums at the state fairs here and in Washington, and that local patriotism would bring this stock to a local show place goes without saying. And, aside from this, the county is first in dairying, first in farm products, not behind any in horticulture, and is in good condition to promote and hold a county fair that will be a credit to old Washington County.

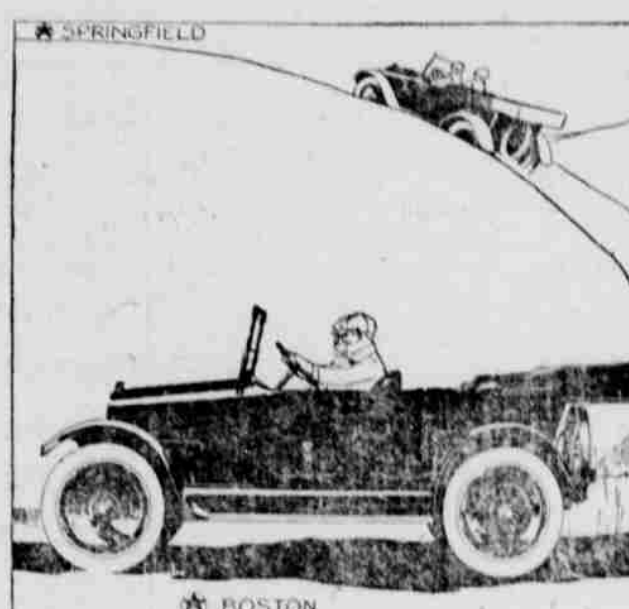
