Attention of water users is called to the fact that during the months of July and August a great deal of water is used for domestic and irrigating purposes within the city, thereby endangering the supply. Knowing this to be the condition the city council passed an ordinance prohibiting the use of water for domestic purposes during the period of a fire; in other words, when the fire alarm is given the ordinance requires a cessation of use of water for domestic purposes until the fire is out.

This is an unfortunate condition and sometime it ought to be remedied. The Water and Light Corporation has been advised of this condition time and again, but it is doubtful if the city will ob-

tain relief along this line at present at least.

Therefore, this statement is made to water users so they may not overlook the provisions of the ordinance referred to in case of fire.
