The funeral service was held this afternoon, at 2:30, at Finley's Undertaking Parlors, in Portland, and interment will be at Maxger, Oregon, tomorrow.

TO AUK-LAND

Ronald C. Vaught, recently discharged from the A. E. F., has gone on State Highway construction near Mt. Hebo, in Tillamook County. This is the country the salubrious climate and idyllic surroundings of which once inspired fellow-townsmen Henry G. Guild to poetic and philosophical musings—also to scientific research. Rumors of the discovery of a petrified egg of that extinct bird, the Great Auk, in that district, filtered through the press some years ago, and its identification by Henry, as an authority on birds and chickens, aroused the attention of the scientific world. Vaught believes that a vacation from the rattling, banging world of cities and towns and the army's disciplinary routine will lead him into philosophical and poetical paths that Henry found so peaceful and restful. Vaught made no suggestions that he intended research work along the line of any extinct birds, but admitted he might give passing attention to any specimens of live ones that might have their habitat in that vicinage.

DIFFERENT DIVORCE CASE

This is a different divorce case—different than the usual run, because the majority of them afford no contest. In this case, wherein Lydia Lahtinen sues Chas. for divorce, Chas. comes right back with an answer. Lydia sets up that they were married at Hancock, Mich., in 1902, and that they have one child, a daughter, aged 12 years. She swears in her complaint that they own 2 acres in Beaverton-Reedville, and that the husband has cursed her repeatedly, and that in May he knocked her down and dragged her around the road. She asks the court to give her her third in the acreage; \$1250 equity in the common property; \$200 suit money and \$100 to support herself and child during pendency of the case and then \$25 per month alimony. After that Chas. comes back with an answer, refusing to take the count of ten. He says that his better half has an ungovernable temper and that she roundly berates him, and that the incident of assault as she relates it, is given entirely wrong, as she was the one who made the physical attack. He states that she about tore his shirt off his back and that she had no force from him except that he exerted himself to get away from her "clutches." He says she has many times hurled dishes at his head regardless, and he asks for a decree and the custody of the child.

FOR SERVICE MEN

Superintendent B. W. Barnes has just received the blank applications for the discharged soldiers, sailors and marines that wish to enter High School this Fall and receive financial aid from the state.

Those wishing to take advantage of this opportunity should apply to the head of the school where they wish to attend for application blanks, which are lengthy questionnaires. This application must be approved before the benefits are available. The Attorney-General has written an opinion that the applicant may attend any institution of learning that offers a course beyond that of the common school or eight grade. The benefit may be applied to board, lodging, or any necessary expense.

Mr. Barnes will be pleased to meet those who wish information on this subject, whether they intend to attend school in Hillsboro or elsewhere.


