

LABOR CONDITIONS RETARD ROAD WORK

Forces Doing as Well as Could be
Expected Considering Things

BEAVERTON IN FEW DAYS

Gaston Work Progressing, War-
rens to Start West From Here

The labor shortage has added to the retardation of permanent road work as well as shortage of materials, but things are moving along very well considering the situation.

The Guthrie people will soon have the cement laid as far as Beaverton, the road now being open as far East as Reedville. The force is now between St. Mary's and Beaverton, and progress is being made getting the city streets at Beaverton ready for laying. By October 1 it is expected that the highway will be open between here and Beaverton, and that will help some.

The Warrens are assembling their camp at Cornelius and will work both ends of the Hillsboro Forest Grove six miles. The G. H. P. Lumber Company have been saving an order for their camp, and it is now partly delivered.

Otto Brose is pushing work on the Gaston Forest Grove line, and John McClaren will start at once improving the Gales Creek road.

The Mountaineer road is being rapidly macadamized between that point and North Plains, and there is now but a small stretch between the county seat and North Plains needing attention.

The Guthrie will in a few weeks finish the state highway work in Hillsboro, and inside of sixty days there will be a nice stretch of roads passable for travel throughout the winter months—which is going to be a blessing.

Labor conditions are expected to improve from now on, since the harvest is about over. A few days more the completion of threshing will release more men, and September will see many more working on the roads than any previous month.

Acreage to be Increased Next
Season in Washington County

CANNING INDUSTRY GROWS

Output This Season Will Bring
Much Money to Community

The Loganberry growers of Washington County have had a big year, and the success of this industry will mean a much larger acreage next season. Many yards have been set out this year, and Hillsboro will have over double the output in 1920. The Wall-Mahon-Hamilton yard, north of town, will add a considerable acreage, and here and there everywhere come reports of a few acres of settings that will materially add to the industry.

The canneries took all of the supply this season, and could have handled more, but in 1920 the present facilities will be inadequate to care for the crop.

The introduction of this crop is going to mean the installing of larger canneries, and Hillsboro and Forest Grove will each require additional to take care of the berries and vegetables of the district.

All over the state come glowing reports of good money made in berry culture and this is having its effect here. It is said that there will be over 500 acres of new vines to be harvested in this community alone next season.

MRS. ALFRED LUELING PIONEER, DIED AUG. 23

Was Widow of County Clerk who
Served in '70s

THE SON WAS ALSO CLERK

Remarkable Woman Passed
Away at Oro Fino, Idaho

Mrs. Mary Luelling, aged 85 years, died at Oro Fino, Idaho, Aug. 23, 1919, and the funeral took place Tuesday, near Millwaukie, in the Luelling burial plot. She was the daughter of a pioneer by the name of Campbell, and was born July 27, 1834, in Massachusetts. She was married to Alfred Luelling in the fifties, and they moved to Washington County in the sixties. Alfred Luelling was elected county clerk of this county in the early seventies and served four years, being succeeded by his son, the late A. W. Luelling. Father and son have long since passed away.

Mrs. Luelling leaves the following children to mourn her loss—Miss Jane Luelling, of Oro Fino, Idaho; John and Seth, Madras, Ore.; and Charles, of Prineville. Two grandchildren live in Washington County, Wilbur W. McEldowney, Cashier of the Forest Grove National Bank, and his sister, Mrs. Mary Strickland, of Forest Grove, children of Mrs. Anna McEldowney, the first wife of W. H. McEldowney, of Reedville. She leaves a grandson, Col. Fred Luelling, of Seattle, who was on the staff of General Pershing in France, having risen from the Washington State Guard to the high position.

Her children who have passed away were Mrs. Anna McEldowney, Mrs. Ellen Givens, wife of Dr. John Givens, Oro Fino, Idaho; Miss Olive, and A. W. Luelling, the latter of whom succeeded his father as county clerk of this county.

Mrs. Luelling was a woman of splendid character and fine attainments, and kept her strength of mind until the last. Her letters written to Mrs. Sylvia Tucker within the past year, commenting upon Hillsboro, after receiving papers from here, would have done credit to a person of younger years.
