Fair Opens There in Morning, With Big Program on Deck

TO FORM PERMANENT CLUB

Jersey Ass'n Will Lay Plans to Celebrate World's Record Cow

The Jersey and Holstein Associations are planning meetings to be held at the Banks Fair this week.

The Holstein Association will meet Friday, October 10th, at 2:30 p. m., and they expect the State Association President to be present, and other breeders have been invited.

The Holstein Association will at this time form their permanent organization, electing permanent officers and adopting constitution and by-laws. They will also take up matters of business of importance to the breed and for the strengthening of their organization in this county. A number of new members have been added since their last meeting.

The Jersey Association meeting Saturday, October 11th, at 2:30 p. m., at which time some of the leading breeders from up the valley are expected to be present.

The Association at this time will lay plans for its activities in the Spring, when the State Association holds its Jubilee, celebrating the breaking of the world's record by a Jersey cow owned by J. J. VanKleeck & Son, of this county. The cow has already broken the record and has yet two months before the completion of her test.

Other important business will come before the association at this time.

Free Bulletins

The County Agent's office has received from the U. S. Department of Agriculture and from the Oregon Agricultural College, a large number of bulletins for free distribution.

The subjects included in the list are fruit diseases, spraying and pruning of fruits, insect control, poultry raising, use of fertilizers, feeding of dairy cows, dairy calf feeding, Loganberry culture, canning of fruits and vegetables and school lunches. Most of the subjects listed include a number of different bulletins and those desiring bulletins should state the phase of the subject in which they are interested.

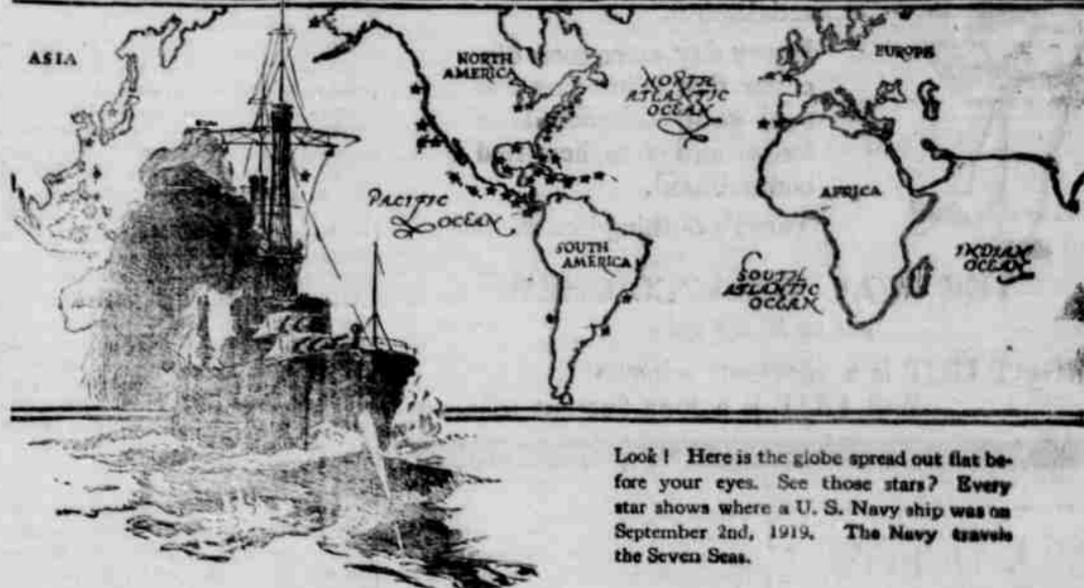
