WORLD'S RECORD COW

The Washington County Jersey Association met Saturday, Oct. 11, and discussed plans for assisting the State Association in the holding of the Jersey Jubilee, which will celebrate the breaking of the world's record by the Jersey cow owned by J. J. VanKleeck & Sons.

The association appointed a committee to confer with the State Association committee with the instructions that they should report back at a meeting to be called by the president in January.

The necessity of official testing was also discussed by members of the association, it being pointed out that there were a number of pure bred sires in the county, about a year old, which were slow sale because of the lack of records behind them.

A. E. Wescott brought up the matter of closer affiliation with state organization and recommended that dairymen joining the county association be members of the state organization as well. He explained that this could easily be done by raising the membership fee in the county organization and dividing it with the state organization.

A committee consisting of A. E. Wescott and N. C. Jamison was appointed to confer with the state association at its meeting during Farmer's week at Corvallis, and instructed to bring before them the matter of closer affiliation with the county organization and also the matter of the Jersey Jubilee. The meeting adjourned to meet at the call of the president, Geo. F. Biersdorff, County Agent.

Rev. G. M. Hammond, National speaker of the Anti-Saloon League of America, will speak at the M. E. Church, Hillsboro, on Wednesday, Oct. 22, 1919.

This meeting is one of a series of National-World Prohibition Rallies that is now being conducted by the Anti-Saloon.

Mr. Hammond has been for 25 years a successful minister. Ten years were spent in the regular pastorate; nine years in evangelistic work. As an evangelist he travelled over 25 states. For nearly six years he was associated with the Anti-Saloon League of Tennessee.

HILLSBORO POST MAKES DRIVE

The Hillsboro Post of the American Legion is beginning a membership drive this week, to continue until the charter is closed on November 11th.
