### INDUSTRIAL REVIEW

Roseburg—Five thousand boxes of tomatoes from five acres of land at Dillard is the record made by T. B. Evans & Son, the largest growers in this section.

Small fruit area in Marion Co. to be increased by 2,000 acres. Enterprise—Rebuilding sawmill of Oregon Lumber Co. here is delayed on account of labor.

Prineville starts new Masonic Temple, and has fine building boom. Hood River—Payroll of the apple pickers will reach \$225,000. Ashland has sent out seventy cars of fruit.

Corvallis—Shortage of apple boxes causing loss to growers. Corvallis—New bakery has installed \$10,000 outfit.

Baker—Rich ore has been found near here valued at \$1000 per ton. Albany doing building stunts in spite of high cost of materials. Plenty of small payrolls make the most prosperous town.

Klamath Falls—Large tract of land to be thrown open for homestead entry.

Gresham—Burns Lumber Co. to build new sawmill. Hood River—Fruit Co. has erected \$10,000 concrete building.

Railroads promise to divert 1000 more cars daily to the sawmills. LaGrande—\$1,498,000 county good roads bond issue carries.

Oregon has 32 banks with deposits of over one million each. Concrete bank building to be erected in Silver Lake.

Pacific Highway between Gold Hill and Central Point completed. Plans to get 50,000 additional acres small fruits planted in Oregon and Washington to produce \$10,000,000 raw material for canneries and juice industry.

Crater Lake company to build new tourist hotel for next season. Lakeview looking for railroad connection and box factory.

Fishing industry on lower Umpqua pays \$600,000 a year to employes. Hood River pear growers netted as high as \$2000 an acre.

Roseburg—Work started on Hamley & Co. brick building. Myrtle Creek—2900 prune trees here bring in \$10,900.

Reedsport sawmills have payrolls of \$1100 a day. Forty acres prunes at North Albany netted \$1500.
