

NOTICE OF DISTRICT ROAD MEETING TO VOTE SPECIAL ROAD TAX IN DISTRICT No. 51

Notice is hereby given that a meeting of the resident taxpayers of Road District No. 51, Washington County, Oregon, is hereby called, and will be in said Road District No. 51, Washington County, Oregon, on the 22nd day of November, 1919, at the hour of two o'clock P.M. of said day, to discuss the advisability of levying a special or additional road tax in said district, to determine what, if any county roads or portions thereof in said road district shall be improved,

in any special manner, and the character and extent of such improvement or improvements they shall make thereon, and to levy such special or additional tax, not to exceed ten mills on the dollar, on all taxable real and personal property in said road district, as a majority of such resident taxpayers of said road district shall deem advisable for the purpose of raising money to defray the expense of such special improvement or improvements in said Road District No. 51, Washington County, Oregon. MRS. SARAH McNUTT

Mrs. Sarah McNutt, well known at Hillsboro and Forest Grove, passed away some time during the night of November 4, 1919, at her home in Cornelius. She was the widow of the late Col. R. W. McNutt, who was one of the pioneer merchants of Cornelius. She was born in Ohio, October 31, 1848, and in 1880 was married to W. S. Pearson, in Indiana. They came West and settled at Forest Grove, where Mr. Pearson died in 1898. Twenty years ago she was wedded to Mr. McNutt, who died in 1915. Since that time she made her home in Cornelius. She leaves a brother and nephew in Kansas, and a niece, Mrs. Brady, at Forest Grove. She was an active worker in church circles and was a member of the Woman's Relief Corps, in which she always took an active interest. She was also patriotic instructor, at the Cornelius public schools.

The funeral took place Thursday, Rev. J. G. Crozier officiating. Interment was at Forest Grove.

Mrs. McNutt was highly esteemed and her work will be missed by a multitude of friends.

FROM OLD FRED

A private letter from Fred Schomburg, well known here tells of Nampa, Idaho, having a big drive for its Commercial Club membership, resulting in the Club now having enrolled 534 names.

Schomburg raised 62½ bushels of wheat per acre the past season, and to show that this was not an exception, last year it yielded 60 bushels per acre. He has been pasturing 20 head of cows on 8 acres of blue grass, and he says it grows better there than back in the famed blue-grass region of old Kentucky. Nampa had 165 days of drouth this Summer, but that doesn't matter in a section where they irrigate. Over 300 new homes have been built there the past year and Nampa is still short of houses. A new hospital, costing over \$60,000, has been built, and the citizens donated half the expense. The big condenser has all it can do, and Fred thinks that there is no place like that part of Idaho for the experienced dairyman.
