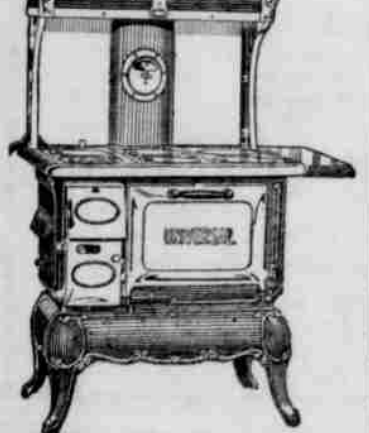

O. A. C. FARMER SCHOOLS

Oregon Agricultural College, Jan. 6. A series of schools to be held throughout the state by the extension department of the College is attracting the attention of farming communities in the various counties.

The schools, which will be held in each county, will begin on January 12 and last for one week. They will be under the supervision of the county agents and the extension department.

N. C. Jamison, our well known Washington county agent, is to cooperate with E. B. Fitts, of the dairy department, and W. S. Carpenter. This branch of the extension work conducted at Banks on January 12 and 13 and at Laurel on January 15 and 16 is to be on the order of Farmers' Week just completed at the College. Lectures, practical demonstrations, and round-table discussions at these schools take the college to the farmer and he may derive a benefit from such schooling that will be invaluable to him in his work at home.

The subjects of dairying and farm crops will be taken up in Washington county. Of interest to the women of the communities will be classes in home economics which will run in conjunction with the dairy and farm crops schools.—Wilbur W. Weed.
