

MOUNTAINDALE CITIZEN HAS PASSED AWAY

Thos. A. Fowles, Well Known
Character, Died Sunday

MANY YEARS A SAWYER

Was Man of Splendid Character
and Universally Esteemed

Thomas A. Fowles died at his home near Mountandale, Sunday, January 11, 1920, at 1:45 p. m. He was born December 3, 1835, at Jefferson, Lincoln County, Maine, and at the time of his death was 84 years 1 month and 8 days.

In 1881 he married Elma Quick who survives, together with the following members of the family: Mrs. George Roberts, daughter, Old Untah, Africa; Bradford, a son at home; Delbert, a son residing at Mountandale.

He also leaves one sister, Mrs. C. E. Shorey, of Hillsboro, and two half brothers, residing at Gardiner, Maine.

Mr. Fowles came to Oregon in 1878, and bought a farm near Mountandale, upon which he continuously resided from that date to his death. For many years he ran the saws in various mills in his vicinity.

His fraternal connection for the past quarter of a century was with the Knights of Pythias, at Glencoe, and subsequently North Plains. Funeral services were conducted by Walton Skipworth, at the Scotch Presbyterian church and interment was in the church cemetery by the Knights of Pythias.

Undertakers Donelson & Bell directed the funeral.

A tribute from one of his neighbors, acquaintances and friends, follows:

"Thomas A. Fowles was a man of sterling qualities, upright, sincere and gracious. He was considerate, not only to his family, but to his friends and neighbors. He had endeavored himself to every one who knew him, and was a man of splendid judgment and strict integrity. What more can a neighbor say of another? It should be added that he was a true, loyal citizen and an American; his record shows that he did all that was possible to aid his government during the great conflict. His passing will leave a vacancy in the community that soon will not be filled.

CO. DELEGATION AT SALEM SESSION

Legislature Doubtless Will Adjourn This Saturday Evening

OLCOTT TO SERVE TERM

Supreme Court Says He is Good for Two Years More

Two big events of state importance were staged at Salem this week. One was the convening of the state legislature in special session to take up matters of state importance. The legislative body confirmed the constitutional amendment on woman's suffrage, and then tackled other matters. It is expected the session will be concluded by the last of the week.

Rep. Hare, of the local delegation, introduced a bill making it unlawful for the state to pay any royalties on paying formulas, and it is expected this will precipitate a fight from the Warrens.

Be that as it may, Hare saved the state several thousand dollars the past two years by his fight on paying the Warrens their usual royalty.

The other event of importance was the fact that the Supreme Court has decided that Ben Olcott is governor for the unexpired term for which Jas. Withycombe was elected.

This means that we will have a new secretary of state—Mr. Kozier, very likely—appointed by the governor.

Senator Wood is representing the county in the upper house, and Hare, Graham and Haines are the representatives in the lower house.
