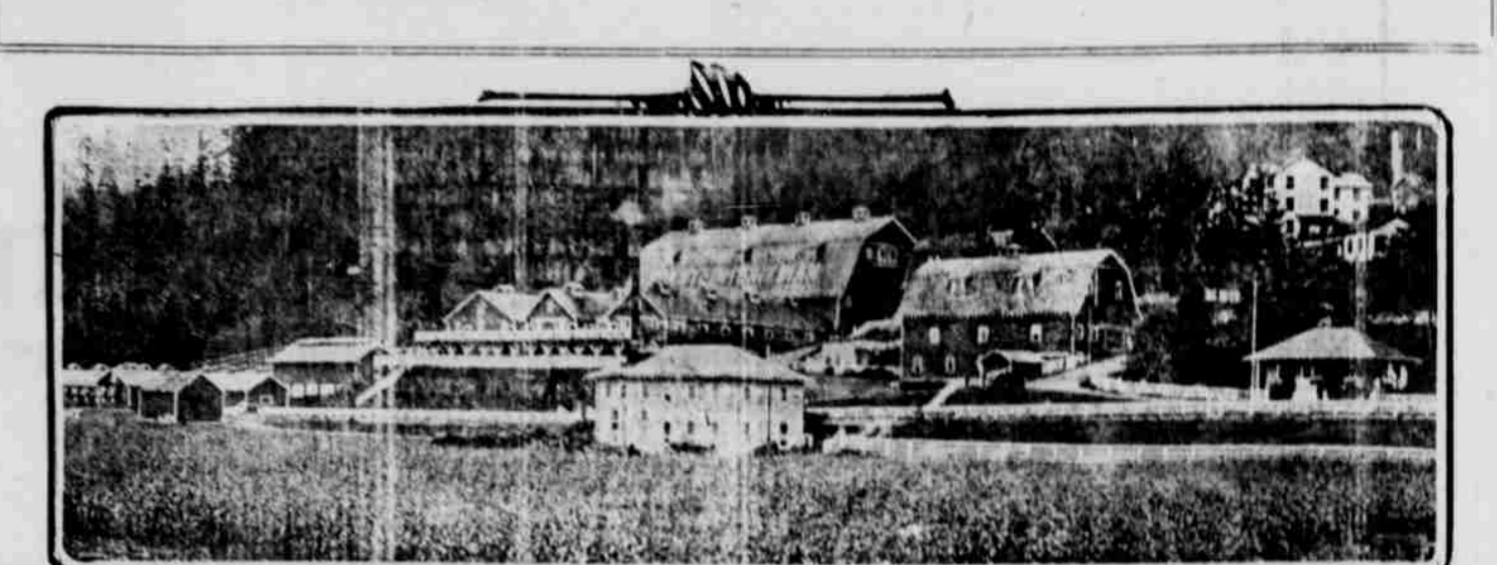

CARNATION IDEA PUTS NORTHWEST MILK IN LIST OF FOOD STAPLES

Carnation Stock Farms, the home of "Contented Cows," and Matador Segis Walker, one of the greatest sires of the Holstein breed. This prize of the Carnation herd took ten out of a possible twenty-three first prizes at the Pacific International Stock Show, held this year in Portland.

The history of the Carnation Milk Products Company in Oregon is so closely associated with its work and development in other parts of the Northwest that it is impossible to understand the one without referring to the other. Carnation milk is the physical embodiment of an idea. Twenty years ago that idea matured itself in the mind of E. A. Stuart, president and founder of the company, who decided that the time was ripe for converting the raw milk of the Northwestern dairy herds into a staple food product, which could be marketed from end to end of the country. He foresaw the future development of the dairy industry of the rich coastal region of Washington, Oregon and California, and knew that it was only a matter of time until the local market would be unable to absorb more than a small fraction of this potential output. So Carnation milk was born, and undoubtedly it was born with a worthy future. It filled a tremendous gap in the American home; it placed the hunter and prospector of the North on an equality with city dwellers with respect to this essential human food product, milk; and it vastly extended the marketing radius for Northwestern milk. With such foresight making for development, Carnation grew by leaps and bounds and soon became a household word throughout the country. Eventually it carried its campaign of conquest into European countries. Milk Made Simple Product.

The effect of the vast markets so developed upon the dairy industry of Oregon is unmistakable. At the present time Carnation plants are operated at Forest Grove and at Hillsboro. Both of these plants are capable of handling all the raw milk which the surrounding country can offer them. This means that the product of the Hillsboro and Forest Grove herds is changed from a perishable commodity, with a selling radius of a few miles, to a staple which ranks in uniformity and keeping quality with sugar, flour, etc. Inevitably a channel of distribution of this caliber reacts upon a territory. Better roads, better farm homes, an increased use of farm ma-

chinery and equipment of various sorts, and last but not least, an increasing percentage of pure-bred cattle—these are among the signs which follow so dynamic a change in selling possibilities. Closely connected with this latter phase, the increased use of purebreds is another angle of Carnation activity, the Carnation Stock farm, at Carnation, Wash. It is hardly necessary at this time, when the Carnation show herd has just established itself as one of the leading Holstein herds of the country by its winnings at the Pacific International show at Portland, to call attention to the quality of these animals. The breeding stock now maintained on the Carnation farm represents a long process of severe test and elimination, only the fittest of the fit being allowed to remain. The idea back of this enterprise is neither visionary nor sordid; if the herds of the Northwest are to hold their own in competition with those of the rest of the world, it is necessary that they should be recruited regularly from the blood of world champions.
