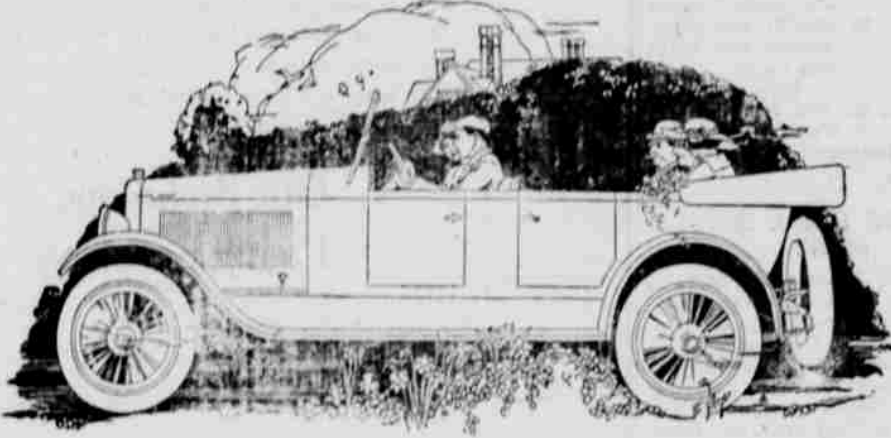

A. R. England was elected Secretary-Treasurer.

Secretary's report shows Loans Closed, since organization, \$269,950.00, and Loans Pending, \$154,350.00.

Dividends declared to the present date, by the Federal Land Bank of Spokane, \$524.55. Surplus, cash on hand, \$834.36. No. of members, 156.

Talks were indulged in by the members as to the benefits derived through the loans from the Federal Land Bank. All were highly pleased with the treatment accorded them by the Bank, and all were unanimous in the conviction that the system should be pushed and that all farmers should take Federal money, when borrowing, and support the only Act that was ever passed to really help the farmer, and not to turn around and take cheap insurance money, and that from private sources—from the parties that used to hold them up for 8 to 15 per cent for money.

FARM BUREAU

Representatives of about twenty agricultural communities met in Hillsboro, Saturday, January 17, to consider the matter of raising the additional funds necessary to carry on County Agent work in Washington County. A. E. Westcott, of Forest Grove, was elected temporary secretary. It developed in the course of the meeting an organized effort would be necessary to raise these funds, yet it was considered of more importance that there be an organization for the carrying out of a definite program of work in connection with the agricultural advancement of the county. It was, therefore, decided to organize a Farm Bureau with a chairman and committee in each one of the agricultural communities of the county. A list of community chairmen were decided upon and the following is a list of those who were asked to act in that capacity: Robt. Banks, E. E. Jones, R. L. Gibson, J. T. Collier, W. J. Griffin, Fred Beach, Wm. Sahnaw, Wm. Hathorn, A. B. Flint, A. P. Christensen, C. True, G. A. Plieth, A. Eggiman, David Tschabold, L. L. Crawford, Joe Saunders, C. V. Galloway, E. A. Ruetter, C. H. Bamford, W. P. Vanderzanden, Chas. Olson.

An organization committee was also selected consisting of A. E. Westcott, A. B. Flint and J. C. Leedy.

Paul V. Maris, State Leader of County Agents, was present and explained the methods of organizing and practice in the other states and other counties of this state. He mentioned that of the twenty counties in this state having Agricultural Agents that 16 of the number are organizing Farm Bureaus.
