COUNTY OFFICERS GET NO SALARY RAISE

Senate Failed to Act on Measure to Increase Payments

BILL AFFECTED SEVERAL

Sheriff was to Get \$2100; School Supt., \$1800, and Assessor \$1800

The bill endorsed by the Washington County delegation to raise the salaries of several of the county officers failed to pass as the Senate refused to take up the measure in its dying hours. The measure as introduced was first brought to the delegation's notice because of the alleged inadequacy of pay of the county school superintendent, and it was thought that the office should pay at least \$1800 per annum, the present salary being but \$100 per month. There is no one in touch with the present day conditions, but who realizes that \$100 per month is just pay for common labor, and pretty common, at that. It was then realized that the assessor, holding one of the most responsible positions in the county, gets but \$100 per month, and it was decided that he was to be better paid. This salary was raised to \$150 per month, and then a raise was given the treasurer's office and sheriff's office, amounting to \$300 per year each.

The measure did not get introduction into the house in time for passage before Saturday, and by this time the Senate had voted to pass no more salary bills, so it died a-borning.

The subject matter is one of many angles when it comes to opinion. There are many who object to any raise in salaries, while others admit the money paid for the services is not sufficient. At that, whether raised or not, there will be all kinds of candidates for the positions.

At least—there always is a full complement of aspirants who will take any office for the present legal salary.
