FORMER COUNTY MAN MIXES WITH I. W. W.

Chief Q. M. Earl Miller Knew How to Reach
 NOW AT MISSOULA, MONT.
 Thought had Something Easy, but ran Against Tartar

A Missoula paper of a recent date tells the following story of a former Shady Brook boy, Earl Miller, brother of Elmer Miller, of North Plains, and of Oscar Miller, of Gales Creek, and son of Mrs. Laura Miller Riley, of Tacoma: "A brief but forceful argument on Americanism late yesterday netted the full ten counts to two I. W. W. debaters and two knuckles out of joint to Earl Miller, chief quartermaster in charge of the Missoula navy recruiting office. One hundred and thirty pounds of solid patriotism proved more than an equal for two heavy weight exponents of syndicalism. Mr. Miller was walking on Railroad Avenue yesterday afternoon. One block east of Higgins Avenue, two husky men in rough clothing, who were waiting there stopped him. Both pulled the red I. W. W. cards from their pockets and waved them in front of the navy man's face. "We're I. W. W.'s, and ain't afraid to tell you so. What are you going to do about it?" said the bigger of the two, who is described as a round-faced sandy haired fellow, with a scar across one cheek and wearing a mackinaw. The other man played an accompaniment of appropriate oaths. The men blocked the chief's path. He never backed out of a fight. But in 11 years battling in many a foreign port, he had learned the advantage of hitting first when you are fighting against numbers. A straightarm jab of the right to the jaw put one man to the ground in a clean knock out. He followed with an uppercut of the same fist which connected with the jaw of the second debater. It put him down and groggy. It was the second blow which dislocated the knuckles of Mr. Miller's hand. He left the men on the ground and went to a doctor. "I have just a little respect for them, even if they did come at me two at a time. I can handle them that way. What I don't like is when they go sneaking around out of sight," said Miller. Mr. Miller did some boxing when he was in the navy. In 1912 he fought his class in Guatemala Bay. He lost a match for the navy championship of that class, and since then has done little work in the ring. His only explanation of the attack upon him is that it resulted from some trouble he had with the organization some weeks ago. He had enlisted a man from Missoula and was sending him on transportation to headquarters at Salt Lake City. The man was in Butte one night between trains. During that time, I. W. W. men talked him out of joining the navy."
