TAX COLLECTION BEGINS FEBRUARY 16

Money to Roll in Week Earlier
Than in Spring of 1919

SHERIFF SENDS OUT NOTICE

Can Pay First Half by April 5,
and Second Half by October 5

Sheriff Alexander gives notice that tax collection will start on Monday, February 16, 1920, a full week earlier than payment opened last year. His notice was brought to the press this morning, and is as follows:

Notice to Taxpayers
Notice is hereby given that on Monday, February 16, 1920, the tax rolls for the year 1919 will be open for collection of taxes, and the first half of all taxes shall be paid on or before April 5 following, and the second half on or before October 5 following. Interest shall be charged and collected at the rate of one per cent per month or fraction of a month in case of delinquency, until paid. Interest at said rate applies to the first half if not paid by April 5, and to the second half if not paid by October 5. All taxes remaining unpaid on October 5 shall be delinquent, and on November 5, 1920, a penalty of 5 per cent will be charged and collected thereon in addition to the interest herein provided.

Any day after the expiration of six months after the taxes charged against real property are delinquent, the sheriff shall have the right, and it shall be his duty upon demand to make out and issue certificates of delinquency against such property, such certificates to bear interest at the rate of 12 per cent. On, or as soon as practicable after, October 5, the tax collector shall levy upon sufficient goods and chattels of delinquent taxpayers and sell same to satisfy said tax, or said sheriff shall charge said personal tax against real property and said tax shall become a lien upon said real property, and shall be enforced in the same manner as other real estate tax liens.

In making request for statement of taxes, town lots should be designated by addition and lot and block number. Acreage should be designated by section, township and range. Whenever possible description should be copied from deed or contract. On paying second half of tax it will be necessary to return the original first half tax receipt. Whether writing or calling at office be sure to give us a list of all property, personal or real, and if personal property is in title to others, advise us, thus saving trouble to you and to the office.

ARNOLD BLADES

Arnold Blades, a well known Hillsboro man, engaged the past few months in sawmilling near Cove Orchard, Yamhill County, died at his home in this city, Saturday, Jan. 31, from an attack of pneumonia. He was taken ill at Cove Orchard about two weeks before he expired, but remained with his work, thinking he was afflicted only with a bad cold. He grew worse and came home, gradually growing weaker until he finally succumbed. He was born Gray's River, Halifax Co., Nova Scotia, Oct. 4, 1880. At the age of 20 years he went to Marble Mountain, Cape Breton, where he spent two years. Later he went to Williamsport, Pa., where he spent two years, then coming to Portland. With the exception of a year in Colorado and Arizona, and a year in Alaska, he spent the remainder of his life in Oregon and Washington.

He was united in marriage to Miss May Hartley, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Hartley, at Maryhill, Wa., Oct. 16, 1912, the widow and two daughters, Jean, aged six, and Hazel, aged four, surviving. Of his immediate family he leaves an aged mother, a sister, Mrs. Mary Frazier, and three brothers, Frank, Chas. and Willis, in Nova Scotia; a brother, George, Monroe, Alberta; a sister, Mrs. Emma Cheney, of Newburyport, Mass.

His death is the first in a family of eight children, the father passing away in November, 1918.

The funeral was held Monday afternoon at the Limer Undertaking Parlors, Rev. Francis Gelvin, of Orenco, preaching the last rites. Interment was in the Odd Fellows' Cemetery, Undertaker Timber directing.

Mr. Blades was a quiet, industrious citizen, and had recently made a big investment in the Cove Orchard mill. He had installed a donkey outfit for logging, and had a yard full of timber and ties ready for shipment when he was stricken. He also had just completed a new home in this city. He was highly esteemed by his associates, and the delegations attending the funeral from all parts of the county attested his genuine worth and high esteem in which he was held.
