CARRIER EXAMINATION

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination for the County of Washington, Oregon, to be held at Hillsboro, Oregon, on February 28, 1920, to fill the position of rural carrier at Laurel, Oregon, and vacancies that may later occur on rural routes from other post offices in the above-mentioned county. The examination will be open only to citizens who are actually domiciled in the territory of a post office in the county and who meet the other requirements set forth in Form No. 1977.
