## THREE PASS AWAY IN ONE FAMILY

Boyd Kenyon Long, His Wife and  
Their Infant Child, a Son

## ALL GO WITHIN ONE WEEK

Husband Was Son of Mr. and  
Mrs. L. A. Long, of Hillsboro

One of the sad events following attacks of influenza was the death last week of Boyd Kenyon Long, his wife, Gladys, and their infant son, born February 10. The child passed within an hour after birth, and the mother followed Friday morning, at 4:30. Feb. 13, the father passing at 8:20 Saturday evening, Feb. 14, at his home on East Salmon Street.

Boyd Long was the eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Long, of Hillsboro. He was born at Wilapa, Wash., in March, 1892. He was educated in the Hillsboro school, and served three years in L. Company, 1st regiment U. S. Army and was stationed for a considerable time at Honolulu. After being mustered out of the service he settled down to railroad work and when stricken had been working for nearly two years for the Southern Pacific Company in Portland. He was a member of the Trainers and the double funeral was held in Portland, Tuesday afternoon. Rev. Sawyer officiating at the Dunning & McEntee Chapel. The Brotherhood of Trainers held service at the Chapel in the Portland Crematorium.

Mrs. Long was aged 23 years, and her maiden name was Gladys McDonah. She was orphaned at an early age, and was reared by her grandparents. She leaves two brothers, one of whom John a veteran of the A. E. F., is now in the city from Walla Walla coming to attend the last rites Mrs. Long had always been an invalid, and her helplessness had developed her husband to a great tenderness, rounding out his life to such an extent that he was a credit to himself and to the community in which he lived.

Besides his parents, Mr. Long is survived by two brothers and two sisters—Donald E. Long now of Seattle; Clifford L. Long, at home; Mrs. Gail W. Wells, of Newberg, and Margaret Long, at home.
