

DR. W. D. WOOD IN STATE TREAS. RACE

Sent in Resignation as State Senator to Gov. Olcott

WILL FILE IN FEW DAYS

Washington County Will Have Man on State Primary Ticket

State Senator Dr. W. D. Wood Wednesday sent to Governor Ben Olcott his resignation as State Senator for Washington County and he will file as a Republican candidate in the primaries for the office of State Treasurer. Senator Wood has represented this county at Salem in the upper house for two terms, and has been given the cognomen of the "Watch Dog of the Treasury." He has always been a consistent advocate of economy, and was with the Senate when it voted to bond for permanent highways. It was largely through his efforts that the bill provided that this county should get highway work out of the first sales of bonds.

There will be several in the race for the office, and the Doctor should run well all over the state, for his record for economy is such that it is commendable. It's about time, anyway, that Washington County had a man on the state ticket.

Washington County Republicans say they will give him a large vote in the primaries and many of the Doctor's democratic friends aver they would like to vote for him.

In all probability the filing for the primary ticket will be made the last of the week, but Senator Wood would not say when asked the direct question.

M. C. LINCOLN

Morris C. Lincoln, aged 80 years, died at the Washington Co. Hospital, Feb. 21, 1920, succumbing to an attack of pneumonia. He was born Jan. 12, 1840, near Syracuse, New York, and when a young man moved to Ohio. He enlisted in the 130th Regiment, Ohio National Guard, and was sworn into the Civil War Service for an enlistment of five years, receiving his discharge from President Lincoln, Dec. 15, 1864, when stationed at Toledo, Ohio. He served as one of the guards at Kelley Island, in the lake district.

He was married to Miss Alberta Carver, in the seventies, and after coming to Oregon settled near North Plains. Deceased is survived by Mrs. Lincoln and the following children, all of whom live at Inverness, Montana: Elbert Joseph, George Clyde, Mrs. Winnie Berry, wife of Preston Berry and Miss Trella.

The funeral took place from the Tuslain Plains Presbyterian Church Tuesday afternoon, Rev. Schmalz conducting the service, and interment was in the church plot, Undertakers Donelson & Bell directing.

Mr. Lincoln was one of the few veterans who attended the National G. A. R. encampment at Columbus, Ohio, last Fall, and he revisited the scenes of his boyhood while East. Notwithstanding his 80 years of age he withstood the trip finely, and returned in good health. He was stricken with pneumonia only a few days before death, and did not call his physician, Dr. W. D. Wood until past recovery.

O. A. C. COUNTY CLUB GETS IN CAMPAIGN

Will Support Millage Tax at Coming Election

STUDENT BODY IS ACTIVE

Miss Asbahr Chairman of Letter Committee

O. A. C., Feb. 25.—The Washington County Club of O. A. C. provided for the furtherance of the plans of the Greater O. A. C. committee in Washington County regarding the educational millage tax at its second meeting Feb. 18.

The club is supporting the publicity campaign to put the need of an increased income for the college through the millage tax before the people. Three active committees have been appointed.

Miss Katherine Asbahr, of Hillsboro, senior in home economics, is chairman of the individual letter committee. It is planned to send out letters to alumni and friends asking for cooperation with the active college organizations, and to influential persons in the county giving pertinent facts about the college and its pressing need.

Miss Camilla Mills, of Forest Grove, a junior in home economics, is in charge of a committee to handle correspondence with commercial clubs and other organizations in the county, including college alumni.

Wilbur Weed, Beaverton, is chairman of the newspaper publicity committee.

The college administration has just put out an eight page booklet containing certain conclusive information of interest to the people of the state. The booklet shows that the present income of the college against that of 1915 has increased but 6 1/2 per cent while the enrollment at the college has increased 100 per cent in the same period. The cost of maintenance at the college has doubled since 1915. With this and other increases in mind it is seen that students at the college in coming years will be handicapped if the people of Oregon do not approve of the millage tax for higher education on May 21. An increase in attendance without an increase in income will mean lessened advantages of the new students over the old.—Wilbur W. Weed.

STEPHEN HENSLEY

Stephen Hensley, 77 years, two months and twenty-five days, died Feb. 24, 1920, at his home on Railroad St., Hillsboro, after suffering a few days from a stroke of paralysis. He was born at Petersburg, Ky., in 1842, and at the age of 18 years enlisted in the Twentieth Kentucky Cavalry, U. S. Army, and served three years. He was captured with his troop at Hartsville, Tenn., and taken to Murfreesboro, Tenn., where he was paroled.

From there he went to Joliet, Ill., and on Dec. 27, 1863, was married to Miss Elmina Brown, who survives him. From Illinois he moved to Indiana, and from there to South Dakota, where he resided 24 years. From Dakota he came to Hillsboro in 1908, residing on a farm for two years, and then moving to Hillsboro, his residence for the last 12 years. To the union was born five children, three daughters and two sons, one daughter passing away nineteen years ago, and one dying in infancy. The widow and the following children survive: J. H. Hensley, Hillsboro; Carl Hensley, of Imperial Valley, Calif.; and Mrs. Daniel B. Emrick, of Hillsboro. Seven grandchildren survive.

The aged man was noted for his unswerving loyalty to his country and his fine sense of justice.

The funeral will be Saturday at the Baptist Church, at 2:30 p. m., and the last rites will be preached by Rev. E. A. Smith, former pastor of the church. Interment will be in the Odd Fellows' cemetery. Undertaker Limber directing.

Hillsboro High journeyed away last week for two games of basketball, a losing one and winning one—but the winning game was grabbed from a team that has hitherto been undefeated. Woodburn lost to Hilhi by score 18-17. Silverton is another story.

A personal account by one of the players follows: "We left the O. E. station in Hillsboro encouraged by a cheer from the agent and the High School students conspicuous by their absence. After riding what seemed an age we reached Silverton. Several big huskies met us there and said they would show us to the hotel. One of our boys asked them if they played basketball, and they said 'No, we are the subs.' Right then and there we knew we were up against some basket ball team—and we were. Our biggest man was a midget by the side of the 'subs,' and we just knew we were licked before we started—thus doth psychology 'make cowards of us all.' When we trotted to the floor to do the classic basket ball steps the Silverton boys did the rest—score Silverton 33 to Hilhi, 21. And yet they had to fight for every point.
