

FIVE HUNDRED DAIRY MEN HERE SATURDAY

Big Attendance at Annual Meeting Attests to Success of Body

NEW ZONE MEN CHOSEN

A. B. Flint, Scholls, and W. F. Haase, S. Tualatin, on Zone Com.

Five hundred dairymen in attendance at the Dairyman's League meeting in annual session last Saturday at Moose Hall attested to the success of the dairy organization the past year, and there was no dissenting voice to the continuance of the work that has meant so much to the producers of milk in Washington County.

Alma D. Katz presided over the meeting and the principal speaker was Aaron Sapiro, of California, who is suggesting a plan of organization not dissimilar to that of California, the best organized state in the union from the producers' standpoint. The new idea was forcibly presented to the convention by Mr. Sapiro, and he will remain in the county for some time taking up the matters presented.

There was general satisfaction expressed as to the work of the Oregon Dairyman's League, and all felt that the body had done producers a world of good in the matters of testing milk and other material benefits.

There will be no change in form until after July 1 and it will then be up to the League members as to what they wish effected.

Arthur R. Flint, of Scholls, and Wm. F. Haase, of South Tualatin, were elected to the zoning committee, and the five men in charge are A. E. Westcott, chairman; R. B. Denny, Geo. Biersdorf, A. B. Flint and Mr. Haase.

FARM BUREAU TO TEST

Fertilizer tests will be made by Farm Bureau members in twelve of the communities of the county this year. The principal crops on which the test will be made are corn and potatoes. The fertilizers to be used will be superphosphate and prepared fertilizers of different brands. A number of trials were made last year of these fertilizers, but due to the dry season little advantage was obtained, though sufficient difference was noted to induce the farmers to repeat the tests. The soils on which these elements are expected to best results are the red hills, beaverdam, and valley soils long cropped to grain. The materials will be used at the rate of two to three hundred pounds per acre and will be harrowed in after plowing and just previous to seeding.—Co. Agent.
