

COUNCIL AND CLUB FAVOR BOND ISSUE

Desire Fervently to Improve
Shute Park This Season

CITY COUNCIL WILLING

Other Important Matters up Be-
fore Club Session Tuesday

The Hillsboro Club had an im-
portant session Tuesday night. W.
G. Hare, who is on the Shute
Park improvement committee
with Mayor Wall and Mr. Long,
visited the council and found that
the city fathers and Mayor were
more than willing to have the
matter go to the public on a vote
as to bonding for the purpose.
The authorities will at once make
a survey of the park and it will
then be taken up and submitted
to the public for the approval or
rejection by a yes or no vote on
bonding. He reported that prob-
ably a vote could be had in May
and money would soon be avail-
able, as it would no doubt be
taken locally.

The signs committee, McPhere-
son, chairman, reported that \$210
had been raised to put up proper
signs on the state highway at the
city's gates. The nature of the
signs is not yet determined.

M. P. Cady, A. C. Shute and W.
O. Donelson were appointed to
confer with Mr. Jamison as to
entertainment when the Van-
Kleeck Jersey cow record is cele-
brated.

A. C. Shute, R. R. Easter and
C. E. Wells were appointed on
the matter of cluster lights for the
main business streets.

It was voted that the State
Highway Commission be asked to
name the highway now completed
as far west as Forest Grove, and
that selected by the Club mem-
bers was "The Tualatin Valley
Highway." Secretary B. W.
Barnes was asked to communicate
with the Commission and tell
them the club's desires, and ask
for a rejoinder.

PAYS TO CERTIFY THE POTATO CROP

Fifty Cents Above Market Price
Is the Value

MANY WILL TAKE IT UP

Costs But \$2.50 Per Acre for Ben-
efit Following

County Agent N. C. Jamison says
that "Certified potatoes pay."
Here is his story:
"Potato growers of Washing-
ton County plan to profit by the
experience of growers in adjoining
counties. In Multnomah
County particularly a few of the
potato growers have taken up
certified seed growing and this
spring they have received orders
for five times as much seed as
they have on hand at a price of
fifty cents above market quotations.

To be certified the potato seed
must pass two inspections during
the growing season and be again
inspected after digging and in or-
der to pass these inspections they
must prove to be disease free and
the tubers must be uniform in
type and true to variety name.

The cost of certifying is \$2.50
per acre and should they not pass
no charge is made. A number of
growers are planning to start this
industry this year particularly in
the vicinity of Forest Grove and
Tigard.

Where this work is undertaken
if certified seed cannot be obtained
for beginning, samples of seed
on hand may be sent to the Seed
Certification Committee at Cor-
vallis, for inspection and if of
sufficiently good quality they may
be used for seed."

PROMINENT GRANGER DIES SUDDENLY

Stricken With Heart Failure
While at Work

J. W. BROCK, AGE 65 YEARS

Was Member of Hillsboro Pa-
trons of Husbandry

James W. Brock died at his home
a mile northwest of the city,
Thursday morning, March 11,
1920. He and Arthur Walker,
who with his wife had gone to
spend the day at the Brock home,
had just gone to the woods to
work in the timber. They were
ready to proceed with the work
when Mr. Brock was suddenly
stricken and died almost instan-
tly.

Mr. Brock was born at Gaston,
Dec. 4, 1855. He is survived by
his widow, Mrs. Nina Brock; his
mother, Mrs. Eunice Walker, his-
ter, Mrs. H. D. Bryant, Gaston;
brother, Wilson E. Brock, of Pen-
dleton, and five children—Mrs.
Ethel Best, Sebastopol, Cal.; Roy
Brock, Bay City, Ore.; Eva, Ro-
land and Ruth Brock, of Port-
land.

Mr. Brock had spent all his life
in Oregon. He was devoted mem-
ber of the Hillsboro Grange, and
he had many friends, both in and
out of the organization. His sec-
ond marriage was to Mrs. Nina
Crow, in November, 1912.

The funeral took place on Sat-
urday afternoon from the Bap-
tist Church, Rev. A. E. Smith, of
Leis, Mr. Brock's former pastor
in this city, conducting the rites.
