

ASKS A QUESTION

The question is: "Has there been any provision made for the upkeep and maintenance of our lateral macadam roads?" I have asked this question of several heavy tax payers on my route, and they are under the impression that there is a certain sum set aside to apply on the above mentioned roads. But in my nine years of traveling over these roads I have failed to see this work expedited. So I have come to the conclusion that there is no provision made in any road legislation for the upkeep of the farmers' roads. It is a shame when we consider the amount of money that has been expended in the county for rock roads and to see them go to pieces in two years time, with no relief in sight, and the poor farmer who is suffering from a common malady known as "gas-tritis" is forced to vote a 10-mill tax each year thinking that in 25 years his district will all be rocked and he can run his "Lizey" the year around. This poor man is standing on his own foot and he doesn't know it, for the roads he built last year will be past redemption next year. If I were King, I would behead a few of those sons who defied the prohibition law and became intoxicated with joy of creating a dozen different road bills and not one

will fill the holes in our last year's roads. No doubt some will say that I am very pessimistic, but far be it from such. I was so optimistic that I bought a gas-wagon 20 years too soon. The Gottlieb road is so smooth that I have to sit on the stamped envelopes to keep the stamps from shaking off them. That shows they are not in "due form."

He named George G. Hancock as his executor, and Mr. Hancock filed his bond yesterday.

The Edward L. Naylor estate was filed in court this week, and Edith Kenworthy, sister, and Geo. L. Naylor, brother, jointly administer. Six brothers and sisters will receive the heritage, which is supposed to be somewhere around ten thousand dollars. Search was made but no will was found.

A. A. Mead's will filed in court gives to his nephews as follows: Ervin D. Mead, \$100, and to Lee L. Albert, Philip, and Roy, each

\$50. The residue of the estate, the total of which is around \$3200, goes to his nephew Fay Mead, and his two brothers, M. M. and Cassius Mead, share and share alike. Fay Mead is the executor.

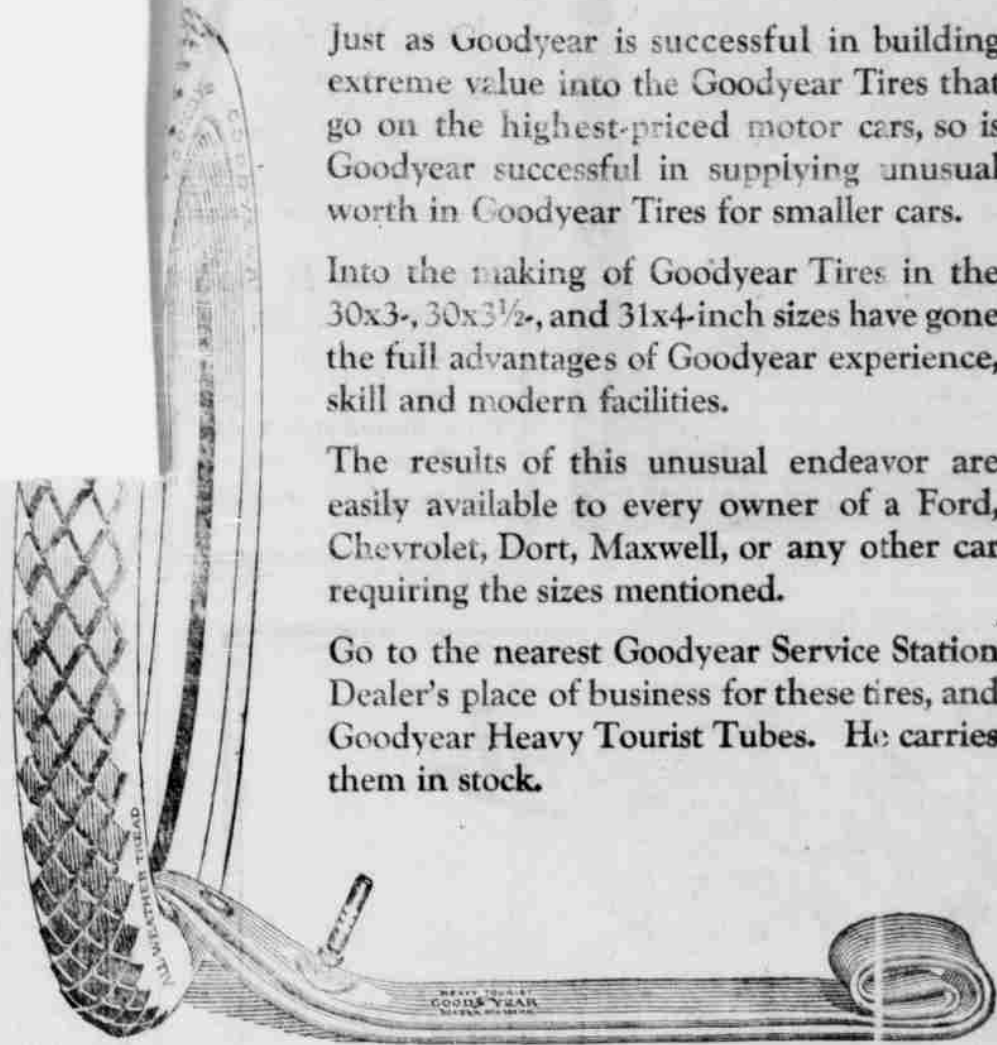
