Arrange for Celebration World's
Champion Senior Yearling

ONE DAY IN THE COUNTY

VanKlee's Champion Holds
World's Record in Her Class

The Wash. Co. Jersey Breeders' Association met in Hillsboro last Saturday to take up the matter of arranging for the Jersey Jubilee, a State Affair, which holds three days in May. The first day will be spent in Washington County—May 1—and the Championship will be celebrated in proper form. Lulu Alpha, of Ashburn, owned by J. J. VanKlee & Son, has a record of 800.08 lbs. of butter fat in one year, starting the test at the age of one year and ten months. This beat the highest record of her class over other breeds by 121.71 lbs. of fat. To the uninitiated it means that the little champion produced a 1,000 lbs. of butter. The committee named to arrange for the affair in this county are A. E. Westcott, of Banks, Wm. Schulmerich, Hillsboro, and J. J. VanKlee, of the State Committee. There will be breeders and officials here from all over the United States and this means that Washington County is marked in the Jersey dairy animals of the world, beating world's records at the age mark. Every dairymen, and every business man in Hillsboro should get behind this celebration. Proper arrangements should be made to take care of the visitors, who will pass thru Hillsboro two times on that day—and Hillsboro's business men should see to it that interest is aroused. It means a great thing for us—to have a world's champion cow.

The Program
In the morning the visiting delegation from abroad and the state will pass thru Hillsboro to visit the Geo. Biersdorf dairy ranch; then to the D. G. Lilly and Thos. Williams dairies at Hillsboro; thence to Forest Grove; and then back thru Hillsboro to the VanKlee dairy at Kinton where they will view the champion, and have a late dinner, and from there they will go on to Yamhill County.

This celebration means value to every Jersey breeder in the county, and incidentally, to the county at large. Dairymen and business men should make this a great affair. Get into your cars; go with the visitors; give them refreshments when they come thru the county seat—you do not celebrate a world's champion cow every year in this section. Give it your support and show that man VanKlee that you appreciate what he is doing for the dairy industry.

The association voted to encourage the county Boys' and Girls' Calf Clubs, and voted to give a first prize of \$10 and 2nd prize of \$5 to winners at each of the various fairs in the county. A committee consisting of Grant Mann, Wm. Schulmerich and Lester Campbell was named to look after this feature.

FIGURES FOR FUTURE LAWS

Dr. Chester Carlisle, of Washington, D. C., in Charge

Citizens of Hillsboro who are known to be in touch with local civic needs have received letters this week asking them to represent the University of Oregon in their locality. They will secure data for the records of the statewide survey as to mental defect, delinquency, and dependency which the Legislature requested at its last session when it passed a concurrent resolution asking for this information so as to be able to have accurate figures on the subject as a basis for intelligent legislation in the future. At the request of the Extension Division of the University, the U. S. Public Health Service is co-operating with the state and has sent Dr. Chester Carlisle from Washington, D. C., to Oregon to take charge of the work as director. The headquarters of the survey is the office of the Extension Division of the University of Oregon at Eugene, to which all correspondence should be addressed.

Eligibility to membership is explained in the following sections from the By-Laws:

ARTICLE III.

Eligibility.

Section 1. The mothers, wives, daughters and sisters of the members of The American Legion, and the mothers, wives, daughters and sisters of all men and women who were in the military or naval service of the United States at some time between April 6, 1917, and November 11, 1918 and died in line of duty, or after honorable discharge and prior to November 11, 1920, shall be eligible to membership in this Auxiliary.

Sec. 2. There shall be no form of class of membership except an adult membership as hereinabove provided.

Ladies whose Legion relatives are members of other Posts must present proof of same.

All members are requested to attend, and all ladies eligible to membership are cordially invited to become members.

FRANK W. MULKEY DEAD FROM INJURIES

High Line Broke and Top of Tree
Struck Lumberman Yesterday

DIED ON WAY TO HOSPITAL

Leaves Widow and Two Children
—Was Aged 34 Years

Frank W. Mulkey, aged 34 years, died on the Pacific Railway & Navigation passenger train while enroute from Cochrane to Hillsboro, yesterday after having been injured at the Wheeler logging camp at Cochrane. Mulkey was working along the high line, and the top of a tree fell on him, crushing him internally. He was given first aid and placed on the passenger train enroute to Portland for treatment. When the train neared Hillsboro Mulkey passed away.

He was born near Roseburg, Oregon, July 26, 1886, and leaves a widow, Mrs. Vivienne Mulkey, and two children.

The remains were brot to the Limber Undertaking parlors and prepared for shipment to Southern Oregon. Mrs. Mulkey accompanied the husband from Cochrane and the death was a severe shock to her.

The father of the dead timberman arrived here this morning to arrange for the obsequies.

Coroner Limber will go to Cochrane Monday and hold an investigation.
