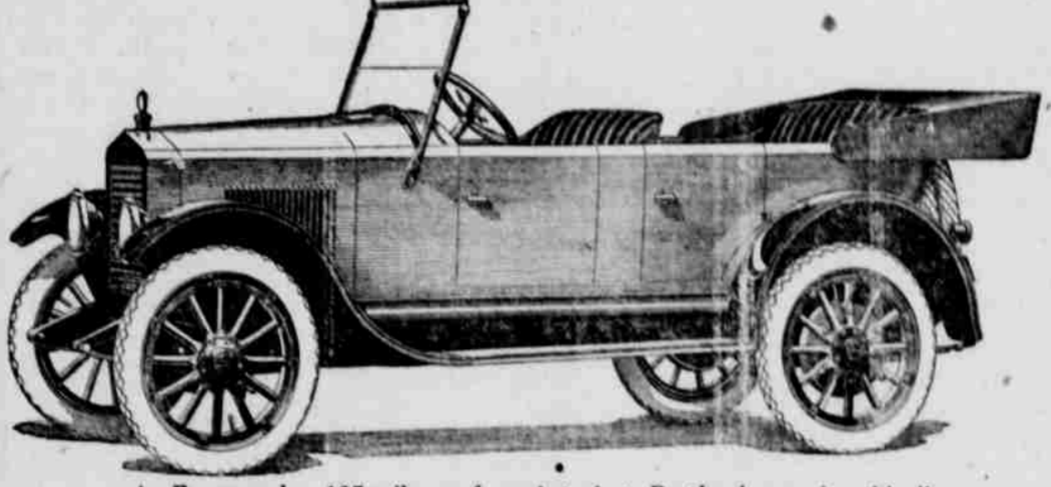

An Essex made a 105-mile run from Astoria to Portland, covering this distance in 2 hours and 21 minutes and beating the best previous time by 51 minutes.

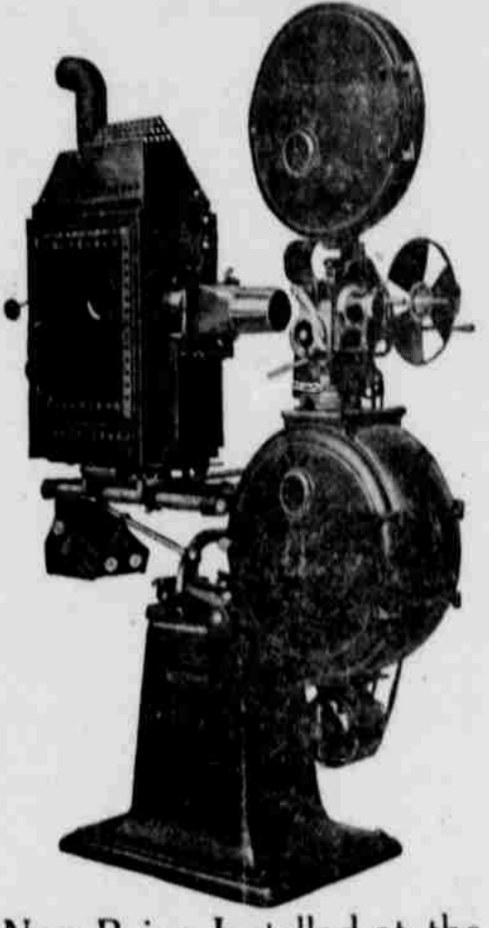
