C. W. G. HYDE

C. W. G. Hyde, who visited in Hillsboro several months ago, died April 12, 1920, at Bridger, Montana. He was born in Genesee Co., New York, July 13, 1838. He spent his early life in New York City and in Jersey City, N. J., and just prior to the Civil War emigrated to Illinois. He enlisted in the Union Army at Springfield, Ill., in 1861, and served throughout the war in B. Company, Fifty-Third Illinois Volunteers. He was discharged at the close of hostilities with the rank of Lieutenant.

After the war closed he moved to Minnesota where he was employed by the Merrill Co., of St. Paul. His interest being aroused in educational work, he served many years as teacher, principal, and Normal instructor. He was at one time Assistant State Supt. of Schools of the State of Minnesota. He was the author of several educational works, one of which was a General History for the school rooms.

He was an active member of Summer Post, G. A. R., of Portland, and always took a lively interest in the Veteran Society.

He was married to Christina Coulthard, at Shokappé, Minn., in 1872, and to the union were born and survive him, Dr. Leon W. Hyde, Hillsboro; Wilfred L. Hyde, an attorney at Superior, Montana; Lawrence P. Hyde, of Minneapolis, and Mrs. L. A. Gates, wife of a physician, of Bridger, Mont. The eldest son, Robt., died at the age of six years. The late Mr. Hyde made a number of warm friends during his sojourn in Hillsboro. Until the end he held his wonderful mental powers, and some of his letters anent the recent war bristled with a patriotic fervor.

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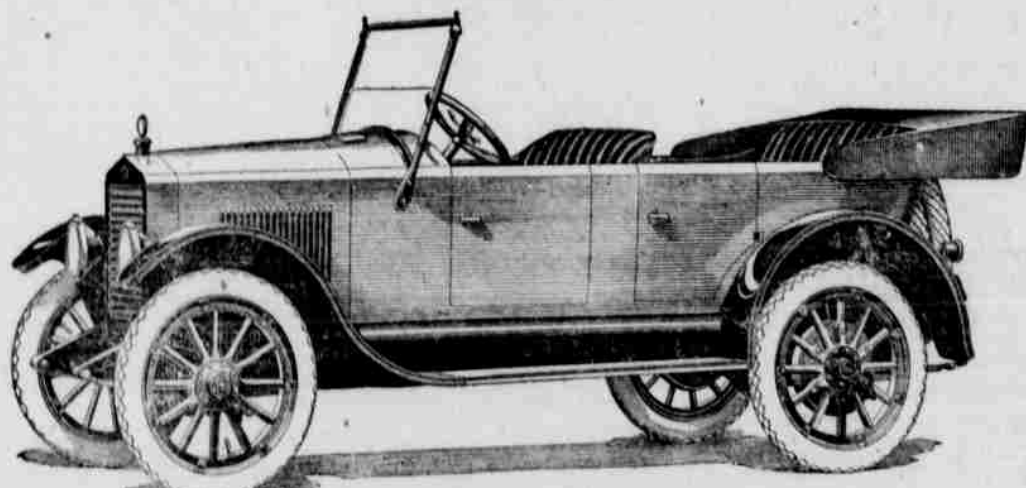
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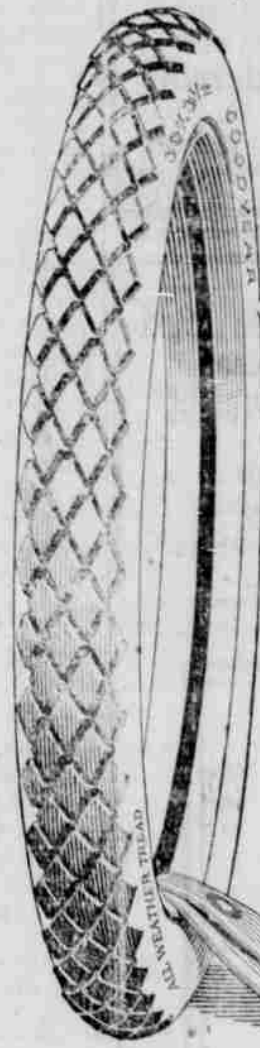
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
