C. E. WELLS IN THE CHAIR

Chairman Shute Receives Many Answers to the Hospital Query

Chas. E. Wells presided at the session of the Hillsboro Club Tuesday evening and there was quite a sprinkling of ladies present to hear Mrs. C. H. Castner, of Hood River, plead for support of the educational measures on the primary ballot. She spoke in behalf of the U. of O. and the Agricultural College, and made it clear that these institutions needed more money if they were to continue to keep their places as colleges.

After the address the Club voted to give the measures its support.

Dr. Robb reported that progress was being made as to gathering sentiment for a county hospital, and stated that after a thorough survey is made the committee will have something tangible to report.

M. D. Cady brot up the matter of the Jersey Jubilee, and said that at the next meeting of the club further action would be asked as to giving the celebration whatever support they may suggest.

A. C. Shute did not report on the hospital survey, but it is known that he is receiving hundreds of answers in the affirmative as to the need and support of a general hospital, and a report will be made as soon as possible—perhaps at the next session.

INTERCHURCH MOVE ASKS \$4800 OF US

County Quota Fixed by State Committee

WILL MAKE BIG EFFORT

State Quota Is Set by Committee at \$230,000

The "citizens' division" quota for Washington County in the united simultaneous campaign of the churches cooperating in the Interchurch World Movement has been set at \$4,800. The citizens' division state quota is \$230,000. This sum is the total for the general campaign, and is in addition to the denominational quotas, several of which already have been announced. The campaign will be directly in the hands of the Interchurch County Director for this county.

This does not comprise a budget for the Interchurch Movement as an organization. The subscriptions to this fund are to be divided among the cooperating churches. In the coming united simultaneous campaign member-ship of the various cooperating churches will be asked for millions of dollars to carry on work which is not of a denominational character, but is for the good of society in its broadest sense.

"The citizens of the county who have the good of the social order at heart will be asked to contribute also through this citizens' division," said the county campaign director, "not for the benefit of any one denomination, not even for the advancement of the established churches from the narrow point of view, but to the end of bringing better, more wholesome conditions throughout the world. For hospitals, schools, missionary centers, welfare work in backward industrial fields. The program of the churches cooperating in the Interchurch World Movement is more than a 'Christian' program in its ordinary accepted sense as applying to particular religious denominations. It is a humanitarian movement—Christianity in its broadest sense."
