Mrs. Ruhama Prosser died at Newberg, Oregon, April 18, 1920, after a lingering illness. She was the daughter of the late John Landess and wife, and was born near Scholls, Oct. 20, 1855. Early in life she became a member of the Church of God, and retained affiliation with it until death. She was united in marriage to W. E. Prosser, Dec. 31, 1885. To the union four children were born, two dying in early life. A son, Corporal Fred Prosser, was killed in action in France, June 24, 1918. The husband and one daughter survive—Mrs. Helen Thorp, of Newberg. Of her immediate family she is survived by four sisters and a brother—Mrs. Minnie Shaw, of Astoria; Mrs. R. N. Stahl, Portland; Mrs. Elta Washington, Portland; Mrs. Gertha Larsen, wife of Carl Larsen, Hillsboro, and Grant Landess, of Hillsboro.

The funeral took place Tuesday afternoon at Scholls. Mrs. Prosser had a wide acquaintance with the pioneers of this section.

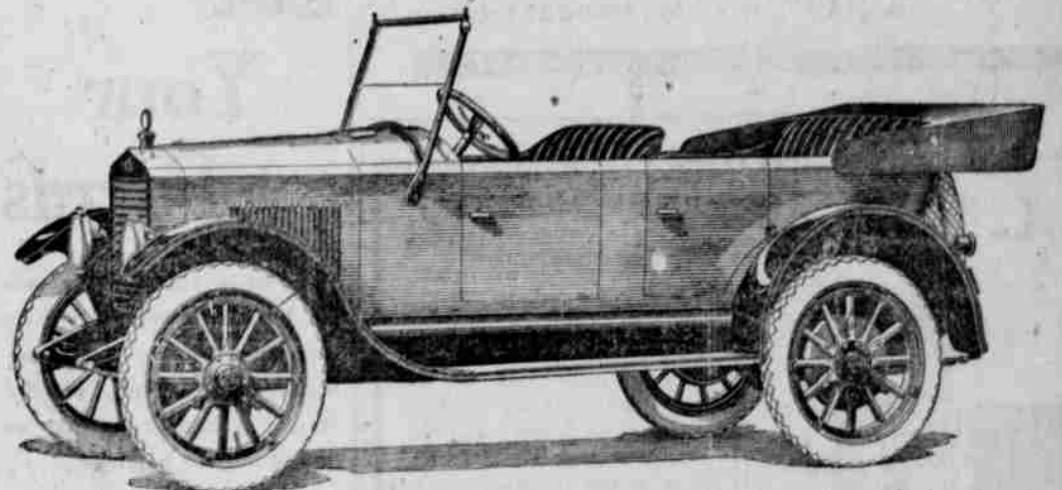
