TALK ABOUT H. C. L.
O. A. C., Corvallis, April 21.—The H. C. L. of today had nothing on Vicksburg City in 1863, according to the "Daily Citizen," published July 2, 1863. A copy of this edition has just been brought to light by Mrs. C. L. Fenton, of Corvallis, who has a wall paper copy of the issue.

"If it would appeal to the heart of stone the present necessities of our citizens would do so." * * * A rumor has reached us that certain parties in our city have been and are now selling flour at \$5 per pound, molasses at \$10 per gallon, and corn at \$10 per bushel, is found in the paper.

This was the last issue of the "Daily Citizen," for the Union forces captured the city while the paper was still unprinted, and after appending a note on July 4, the paper came out two days later. The note says:

"Two days bring about many changes. The banner of the Union floats over Vicksburg." * * * The Citizen lives to see it. For the last time it appears on wall paper. No more will it imagine the luxury of mule meat and fried-seed kites—urge Southern warriors to such diet never more. This is the last wall paper edition, and is, excepting this note, from the type as we found them. It will be valuable hereafter as a curiosity."

Returning invalided from the siege of Vicksburg, Corporal Asabel Fenton, Company G, Fourth Michigan Infantry, gave the paper to his wife, who still retains possession. The paper is in an excellent state of preservation.
