### TWO MEN KILLED

Lester Ridge, aged 20, of Beaverton, Or., and William Lane, aged 28, were killed last Thursday afternoon at the Haskell-Carpenter logging camp at Cherry Grove. Lane was killed instantly, and Ridge died within an hour after the accident. A log, which was being dragged by a donkey engine, rebounded, striking both men. Ridge had his skull fractured from the impact.

The remains of Ridge were taken to Beaverton for burial, his folks living there.

Charles Crumican, aged 30, was badly injured, having two ribs broken and a possible puncture of one lung. His wife and two children live at Gaston.

Crumican was taken to the Good Samaritan Hospital, Portland, for treatment.

Ridge had been employed but four days. Lane had been with the company for several months. Coroner Limber held an inquest Monday.

### SEED CORN SCARCE

The number of requests for seed corn the past few weeks, indicates that there is a shortage of home-grown seed in this County. Inquiries sent to other Counties, reveals that other parts of the Willamette Valley are in no better condition with respect to a climated seed. Even where corn matured last year, and quantities were retained for seed, severe losses were sustained, owing to the freeze in December, and it is now apparent that the shortage is quite general.

A number of Washington County farmers have already made purchases of Eastern seed and those who have been planning on using local grown seed, should make inquiries at once, or they may be unable to get an adequate supply of any kind.

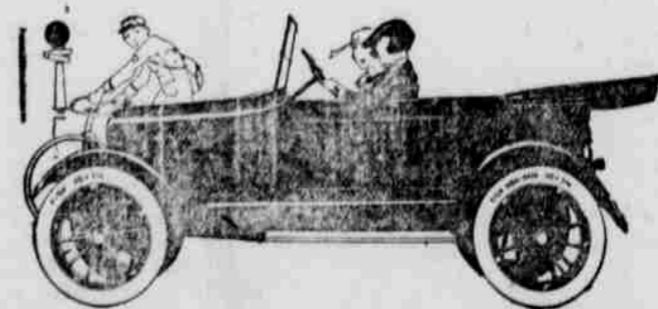
## Roads Seem Pressed Flat By Wonderful New Triplex Springs
