

PLANS COMMITTEE REPORT ON BUILDING

Want Auditorium to Seat Fifteen Hundred People

CLUB ROOM FOR BOYS

Committee From Portland Hospital Arrive Today—Look at Sites

The plans committee on the Memorial Building, J. H. Garrett, Chairman, reported to the general committee last night that they favored a structure to cost from \$50,000 to \$75,000. They think an auditorium to seat 1,500 people; a big club room for the service men with a huge fireplace in it; an assembly room for the boys, and a kitchen and dining room, would be about the thing for a Memorial building.

Methods of raising the money will be taken up at their next meeting.

A committee from Portland representing the Advent Hospital came out this morning and looked over the Cable property and the County Farm property as possible sites if they decide to come to Hillsboro.

A big committee from the Hillsboro Club joined with Harley Peterson in escorting them to the sites.

TOMORROW PRIMARY DAY IN OREGON

Registration is Under the Vote, But you can Swear in

2 FREE HOLDERS NEEDED

This Will Then Act as Registration for the Fall Election

The Argus many times has been asked if it is possible for any one to vote in the primary provided they have failed to register. The law says that this can be done in all counties outside of Multnomah. That county allows no one to vote unless he or she be registered, but the solons at Salem felt that in the country districts there should be more leniency shown, because many lived away out in the mountains, and, inasmuch as registration methods were changed so often, it was deemed advisable to allow voters to swear in at the election. So, if you have failed to register it is up to you to get two free-holders who will swear that you are a voter and eligible to a vote in your precinct—and that is all there is to it. The chairman of the election board will swear yourself and witnesses and you can vote your choice. If a republican you will be given a republican ballot; if a democrat you will be given a democratic ticket. There is no vote, however, for an "independent," or any other ticket.
