The Cendors are a fast bunch, but they weren't able to get the range of the Legion men at any time, and the way Hillsboro played ball warmed the cockles of the hearts of the baseball fans so they never noticed the coolness of the afternoon. The game was played in an hour and 25 minutes, was full of action at all times, and was league stuff at that. Pitcher Gray, the little southpaw, was in fine form, letting the visitors down with only 4 hits. He struck out nine of their swabstomps among whom were lads that have been getting hits off other pitchers in the inter-city league. He also fielded his position like a veteran of the diamond, taking five chances without an error. It was a bang-up game from start to finish and the several hundred who witnessed it were more than pleased with the brand of ball the H. A. L.'s are putting up. The outfielders shouldn't be overlooked, either, for they have gone thro four games without an error being chalked against them, taking everything in sight where there was a possible chance.

## HIRAM JOHNSON GETS COUNTY IN PRIMARY

Polls Forty Per Cent. of the Republican Vote Cast

## CO. OFFICES HOSS RACE

Legislative Ticket is Close, L. M. Graham Being Just Back of Wire

Primaries come and primaries go but the public interest is always keen in the outcome of a republican primary in Washington County—for a nomination generally spells election so far as the county candidates are concerned. Hiram Johnson polled the presidential nomination, receiving forty per cent. of the vote cast. The vote was very light and Johnson was given 1571 out of the 3709 votes cast in the presidential fight. Every one supposed to be versed in politics thought Johnson would be topped by Leonard Wood, but the gentleman who was mad because he didn't get to go to France received only 1240 ballots. Hoover, who announced he was off the ticket, but whose name was printed on the ballot, was given 497, while Mr. Lowden, who is a son-in-law of Geo. M. Pullman, of Pullman car fame, received 501.

The county ticket, in the cases of the legislative candidates, and the commissioners, was a "hoss race" from start to finish.

The vote is being canvassed by Deputy Luce, L. A. Jackson and D. R. ## CITY COUNCIL TO HOLD CONTROL

Passes Resolution Not to Sub-let for Dancing

## CLUB ASKS FOR SUPPORT

City Fathers Will Not Allow Individuals to Conduct

The City Council Tuesday evening passed a resolution to the effect that no persons shall be permitted to conduct dances in the proposed pavilion in Shute Park, and when dances are allowed, at such functions as celebrations, the affair will be under direction and supervision of the council. This action was brot about because of the Hillsboro Club's resolution, which reads:  
To the Honorable City Council of the City of Hillsboro, Gentlemen:—

At a meeting of the Hillsboro Club held Tuesday evening, May 18th, 1920, a resolution was passed directed to the City Council in substance as follows:

Whereas, the Hillsboro Club initiated the idea of improving the Shute Park of the City of Hillsboro and appointed a committee to confer with the City Council to the end that the Council would call a special election for the purpose of voting bonds for such improvement;

And Whereas, contemplated in such improvement was the erection of a pavilion for public use;

And Whereas, pursuant to such request of the Hillsboro Club the City Council acted favorably upon such report and submitted to the tax payers of the City of Hillsboro at a special election to be held on June 8, 1920, a \$15,000 Shute Park bond issue;

And Whereas, it was and is the intention of the Hillsboro Club that a portion of such bond issue should provide for the erection of a pavilion as aforesaid and that said pavilion should be under the control at all times of the City Council, and that said pavilion should not be leased, sublet or rented to any individual for dancing purposes and that when said pavilion shall be used for dances it is the sense of the Hillsboro Club that such dances shall be under the immediate supervision of the City Council at all times.

Now Therefore, Be it resolved, by the Hillsboro Club at the meeting above set forth that this resolution be directed to the City Council of the City of Hillsboro requesting the Council to pass a resolution embodying the foregoing provisions, and that said resolution be duly adopted by the Council and entered in the records thereof.

## MEMORIAL DAYS

The Grand Army Post and Relief Corps, assisted by the Spanish War Veterans and the American Legion, will properly observe Memorial Days, May 30 and 31. On Monday the four organizations, together with the Hillsboro Band, will convene at the court house square at nine in the morning. The G. A. R. veterans and Relief Corps will be escorted to the cemetery by squads from the Spanish War Vets and the American Legion. The ritualistic service will be conducted at the graves of the fallen veterans and at the conclusions the mounds will be decorated.

The parade will then return to the court house square in the same formation as it proceeded to the cemetery.

At two o'clock p. m., the assembly will convene at the Methodist Episcopal Church for the exercises, consisting of songs, recitations, etc. Hon. H. V. Gates will be the speaker.
