POOLS DISCONTINUED

Mole pelt pools will be discontinued until further notice, owing to the slump in the fur values, and also the fact that Portland is the best market in the United States.

The pool of last month, consisting of about 400 furs, was shipped East, and arrived just in time to meet a reduction in fur prices of 60 per cent. It was then found that though the slump had also effected Portland, that the dealers there were yet paying the highest prices of any dealers, and the Eastern shipment will be returned and disposed of to Portland firms.

Hereafter, pelts may be sent direct to the Portland dealers, and as much will be received in that manner as through the pool, at the same time a saving in postage will be effected.

Should Eastern prices again become higher than those here, the pools will be resumed, County Agent.

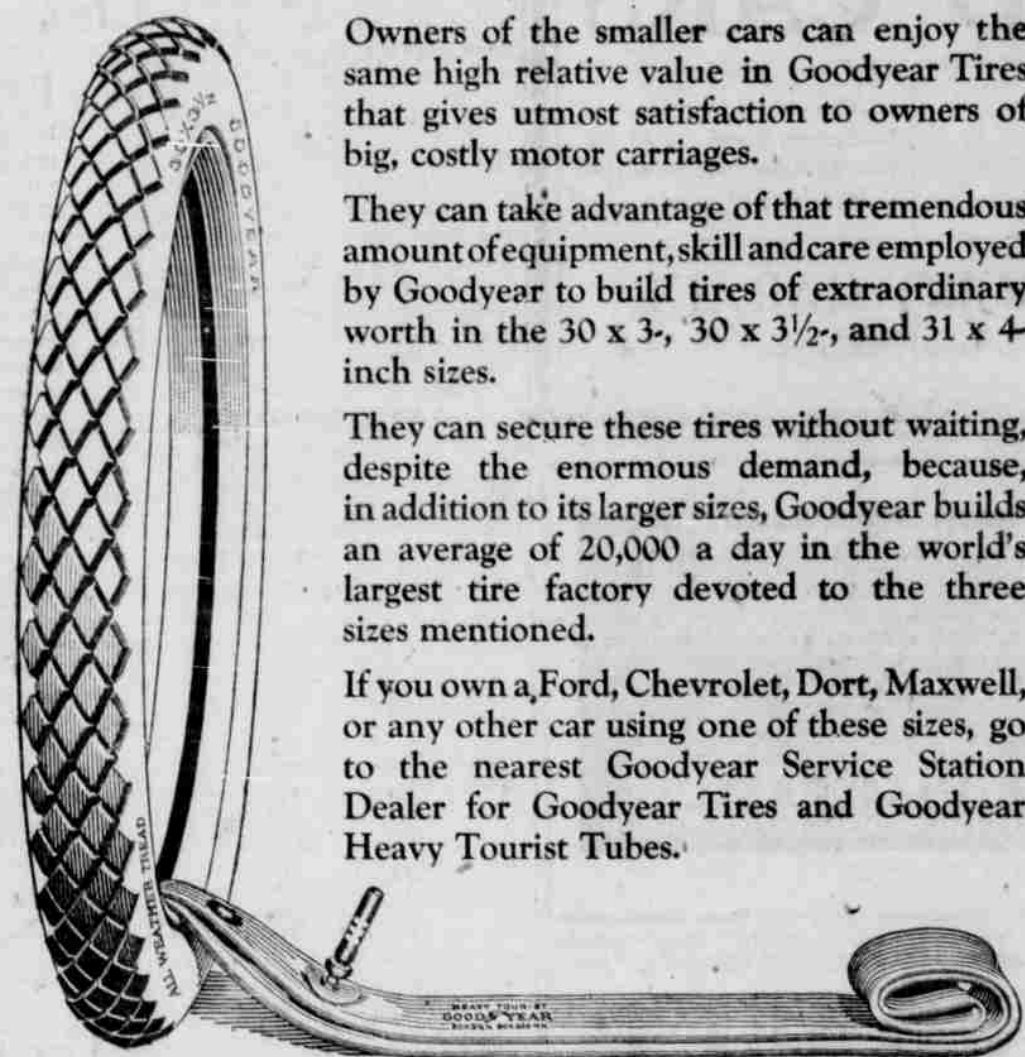
